

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS. Regular May Term of the County Board.

J. H. Morton, John Lewelling and T. R. Killin, County Commissioners.

It is remembered, That a regular term of the Board of County Commissioners for the county of Clackamas, state of Oregon, begun and held at the court house in said county and state on Wednesday the 1st day of May, 1901, the same being the regular time fixed by law for the transaction of county business. There were present, Hon. J. H. Morton, Hon. John Lewelling and R. T. H. Killin, commissioners; E. H. Cooper, clerk; and J. J. Cooke, sheriff, when the following proceedings were had to-wit:

In the matter of the petition of John Egan for a rebate of tax. This matter being on a written petition filed coming up on a written petition filed being shown that John Egan was herein, with and paid the tax upon 105 acres more than is owned by him the said John Egan for the year 1899, and said John Egan for the sum of \$10.97 asking for a rebate of the sum of \$10.97 asking for a rebate of the sum of \$10.97...

In the matter of the petition of E. Austen for aid for Ira Phillips, an indigent person. This matter coming on E. Austen appearing in person and representing to the board that Ira Phillips is an indigent person 73 years of age and in need of aid, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that the said Ira Phillips be allowed \$10 for the month of May, 1901.

In the matter of the petition of Louis Funk, et al, for a county road. In the matter of the petition filed by Louis Funk and more than twelve householders of the county living in the vicinity of the proposed road described in the petition and praying viewers to be appointed to view and locate a county road in Clackamas county, Oregon, described in full as follows: Beginning at the south end of Clear Creek bridge in section 4, township 3 south, range 3 east, thence west along the present traveled road wherever practical to intersect with the Grim's Mill and Hatton road at or near the public road board in section 31, township 2 south, range 3 east; thence in a southeasterly direction on the most practical route to the center of Viola and Oregon City road about 100 feet west of a corner on aforesaid road, said road to be 60 feet wide, and to vacate all parts of roads not included in the survey, said petitioner filing his affidavit of notices posted respecting said road showing that there had been posted: one on the court house bulletin board and three in three of the most public places in the vicinity of the proposed road more than thirty days prior to the presentation of the petition. He also filed a bond for one hundred dollars conditioned according to law. The board being fully advised, it is ordered that W. M. Stone, James Pullman and George Hinshelwood be and are hereby appointed viewers to meet at the beginning on the 9th instant and subscribe to a written oath of office administered by E. P. Rands, county surveyor, or John W. Meldrum, deputy county surveyor, appointed by the board to survey said road and report in writing at the next regular term of this board.

In the matter of the delinquency tax claim against Nathan Graham heirs. Now on this 1st day of May, 1901, this case coming on to be heard at a regular meeting of the commissioners' court, and it appearing from the petition of Margaret Gaines and from the exhibition of a receipt in full that the taxes assessed to the Nathan Graham heirs for the year 1892, have been paid in full, and it further appearing that the lands of said Nathan Graham heirs were sold to Clackamas county for said 1892 taxes by mistake, and that the tax records of

Clackamas county show such delinquency and sale. It is therefore ordered and adjudged that said record of delinquency be cancelled and that the county clerk enter said cancellation on the sales book for delinquent taxes for the year 1892.

In the matter of road supervisor in road district No. 29, Union precinct. This matter coming on and it appearing to the board that C. F. D. Wilson, the duly elected supervisor of road district No. 29, Union precinct, has resigned and that his resignation has been filed herein. And the board being fully advised, it is ordered that the resignation of C. F. D. Wilson be accepted, and it is further ordered that:

be and he is hereby appointed road supervisor for said district No. 29, Union precinct and that he duly qualify by filing his bond in the sum of \$1000.

In the matter of the petition of G. Muecke, et al, for a county road. This matter coming and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that the petition of G. Muecke, et al, for a county road, be and the same is hereby denied.

In the matter of the petition of James Fullam, et al, for a county road. In the matter of the petition of James Fullam and more than 12 householders of the county living in the vicinity of the proposed road described in the petition and praying viewers to be appointed to view and locate a county road in Clackamas county, Oregon, as follows: Beginning on the south boundary line in the center of a three-acre tract owned by August Hubert and running in a northerly direction about 300 feet and intersecting the old Cutting Mill road near the northeast corner of the above named three-acre tract. Also relocate the road beginning at northeast corner of August Hubert's three-acre tract and running in an easterly direction to the northeast corner of the August Hubert land claim, said petitioner filing his affidavit of notice posted respecting said road, showing that there had been posted: one on the court house bulletin board and three in three of the most public places in the vicinity of the proposed road more than thirty days prior to the presentation of this petition. He also filed a bond for one hundred dollars conditioned according to law. The board being fully advised, it is ordered that John W. Meldrum, deputy county surveyor, survey and stake out said road, and that upon said August Hubert making a deed to same, said deed will be accepted upon the 10th instant, and John W. Meldrum, deputy county surveyor, being appointed by the board to survey said road, that he report in writing at the next regular term of this board.

In the matter of the report of viewers on a change in the Buckman road. In the matter of the report of Richard Oldenstadt, John Mosier and Fred Oldenstadt, viewers appointed at the last term of this board to view and locate a county road situated in Clackamas county, Oregon, and described in full on page 7 of this journal, said viewers filed their report showing that they had met on the 16th day of April, 1901, a day named in the notice served upon them and were duly sworn by subscribing to a written oath of office administered by John W. Meldrum, deputy county surveyor after which they proceeded to the designated place and did view and caused to be surveyed by said deputy county surveyor the above described road. They also filed the field notes and plat of the survey, said viewers report favorably to the establishing of said road as viewed and surveyed for the reasons that it is a good, practical route and of public utility. It is ordered and adjudged that the field notes and plat of said survey be recorded and in all respects approved and that the said views and survey be established as a county road and that the expense account of said view and survey be paid by Clackamas county and the clerk is hereby ordered to issue the necessary notice to the supervisor of district in which said road lies to open and work the same all that portion of road heretofore described and asked to be vacated and the same is hereby in all respects ordered vacated on the opening of said road.

In the matter of the report of viewers on the D. C. Rones road. In the matter of the report of R. S. Coe, sr., D. R. Dimick and James Evans, viewers appointed at the last term of this board to view and locate a county road situated in Clackamas county, Oregon, and described in full on page 8 of this journal, said viewers filed their report showing that they met on the 18th day of April, 1901, a day named in the notice served upon them and were duly sworn by subscribing to a written oath of office administered by John W. Meldrum, deputy county surveyor, after which they proceeded to the designated place and did view and caused to be surveyed by said deputy county surveyor the above described road. They also filed the field notes and plat of the survey, said viewers reporting favorably to the establishing of said road as viewed and surveyed for the reasons that it is a good, practical route and of public utility. It is ordered and adjudged that the field notes and plat of said survey be recorded and in all respects approved and that the said views and survey be established as a county road and that the expense of said view and survey be paid by Clackamas county, and the clerk is hereby ordered to issue the necessary notice to the supervisor of the district or districts in which said road lies to open and work the same.

The North American Review for May continues the series of articles on great religions of the world with a paper on "Jews and Judaism in the Nineteenth Century," by the Rev. M. Gasler, chief Rabbi of the Sephardi communities of the British empire. The distinguishing feature of the history of Jewish life during the past hundred years, Rabbi Gasler points out, has been the awakening and strengthening of self-consciousness and the desire of securing absolute equality with non-Jews.

This tendency has asserted itself in all the walks of life, in politics as well as in science and religion, and Rabbi Gasler traces it from period to period as it exhibited itself among the Jews of various countries. Of Zionism, he says: "We are standing at the beginning of this movement, which alone will assist in solving one of the most perplexing problems in modern society, will free Europe of an element which is still considered as alien, and will be treated as such, according to circumstances. There are some, among the richer Jews, who have veiled interests and narrow conceptions; they are held fast in the meshes of self-delusion and cannot differentiate between the rights and duties of a citizen and the historical obligations of a national and religious life; they are still holding aloof from this movement. The vast masses, however, the sufferers and toilers of the earth, have rallied enthusiastically around it. This is the sign under which Judaism enters the new century."
