THE LOCAL NEWS.

BAPTIST JUNIOR SOCIABLE—The sociable at the Baptist church Friday, was fairly well attended, and a programme prepared by the juniors rendered. All present enjoyed a pleasant evening. The proceeds of \$10 go toward paying for the Sunday School piano.

BASEBALL—In the game at Portland Sunday between the Pontellas and Company A the former nine was victorious by a score of 15 to 8. The Oregon City team was out of practice but expect to make a good showing next Sunday with the Stephens nine. Game will be called at 1:30 p. m. in Portland.

SOLID SILVER CUP—It behooves the Company A's, to don their suits and go at it. Practice may not make perfect, but it undoubtedly will raise their standard. The Willamette Valley Chautauqua Association will present to the winner of the baseball tournament a handsome solid silver cup, valued at \$60. The winning team will feel proud of such a trophy, and their town will be proud of them.

BONDS DELIVERED—The new municipal bonds were delivered Monday to Paxton, Beach & Simon, attorneys for

the purchaser, August G. Klosterman, the city receiving a premium of \$2,900. These bonds were issued to redeem the old \$30,000 6 per cent and are for \$30,000, drawing 5 per cent interest, payable semi-annually, the whole amount payable in 20 years from May 1.

RED CROSS ENTERTAINMENT—On Friday evening of last week, the Red Cross order gave an entertainment and sociable to members and friends of the order in observance of the first anniversary of the order in Oregon City. Members of Portland orders were present, and during the evening six new members were received and five applications. The order numbers upwards of one hundred members at the end of its first year.

RYES FOR HATCHERIES—Field Superintendent E. U. Greenman and John A. Bradley left Monday evening for Lewiston, Idaho, where they inspected the streams leading into the Columbia river, in search of suitable sites for salmon hatcheries. Master Fish Warden, H. G. Van Dusen accompanied them to the Dalles with the intention of locating sites for hatcheries on the John Day and Deschutes river.

NEW MANAGER—At a meeting of Company A baseball team Monday evening Manager Hallian resigned and Mr. McFarland was elected in his stead. The boys are very enthusiastic over the team's prospect, and will practice daily. It is the intention of the nine to secure grounds on a three year's lease and fence them in. A subscription will be taken soon to keep the team in good standing and a percentage will be returned to the subscribers from the gate receipts. The outfit of the defunct Jolly Fellows team has been purchased by the new organization.

CAPTAIN GRAHAM'S NEW HOME—Captain A. W. Graham, formerly of Oregon City, is building a two-story dwelling in Portland on East Twentieth and East Taylor streets, which will cost about \$5000. It faces East Taylor street, with a wide veranda extending across the front. The veranda is supported by four large wooden piers. Entrance is from the veranda directly into the large hallway. The vestibule, now found in most modern houses, is absent. While the rooms are not yet finished it can be seen that Captain Graham will have an attractive and convenient home. There are eight large rooms.

MOCK TRIAL SUCCESSFUL—At the Congregational church Friday evening, of last week, the mock trial proved entertaining and amusing to the goodly audience present. A jury was taken from the audience and the witnesses were chiefly high school pupils. The evidence was good on both sides and the case so closely contested that the jury failed to agree on any verdict except to unanimously disagree. Ice cream and cake were served and candy was sold, all aggregating a handsome amount for the benefit of the Saturday Club.

CHANGE OF TIME—The O. R. & N. Co. Tuesday inaugurated a new schedule for its Willamette river boats. The Ruth will leave Portland Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays at 6:45 a. m., returning leaves Corvallis on the alternate days at 6 a. m. On the Portland-Independence route the Elmore will leave Portland Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 6:45 a. m., leaving Independence on the alternate days at 6 a. m. The Modoc on the Dayton run will leave Portland at 7 a. m. Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays and Dayton on the alternate days at 6 a. m.

REDUCED TIME TO PORTLAND—Repairs are being made all along the line of the East Side Railway preparatory to improved service. At the Milwaukie shops two electric trolley cars are nearing completion, and at San Francisco four others were contracted for several months ago and will soon be ready for shipment. These cars are much larger and heavier than those now in service and will use electric motors twice as powerful. A big freight car has been built at the Milwau-

kie shops which will be provided with 300-horse-power motors. When this rolling stock is completed and the track repaired to carry it, the time between Portland and Oregon City will be reduced to 30 minutes.

COUNCIL'S SPECIAL—The council met in special session at 9 o'clock Saturday morning for the purpose of considering the ordinance providing for the issuance of bonds to refund the outstanding bonds of Oregon City, which were due May 1. The ordinance which was previously published in the Enterprise, passed without a dissenting vote and was approved by Mayor Dimick. This is the ordinance required by the attorneys for August G. Klosterman, the successful bidder for the bonds. The recorder was instructed to express to Councilman S. V. Francis the sympathy of the mayor and council and to wish him a speedy recovery from the effects of his accident.

BOARD OF TRADE TONIGHT—There will be a special meeting of the Oregon City Board of Trade and business men in the county court room on Friday evening, May 17, at 8 p. m. to consider matters of general interest to the city. There will come before this meeting a special report from the road committee, on matters heretofore referred to them, in which they will make certain recommendations as to work for the coming summer. It is expected also that representatives from the Sellwood sub-board of trade will be present seeking an endorsement of the business men of the city for the location of the Lewis & Clark Exposition at City View Park. Other matters of interest to the city will be brought forward and a large attendance is especially requested.

WEDDING AT SHUBEL—The marriage of Miss Hattie Guenther, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Guenther, of Shubel, Ore., and Mr. C. Grasier, of Oregon City, was solemnized at the home of the bride's parents, Saturday, May 11, at the hour of 2 p. m. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Copley, of Oregon City, in the presence of many friends. After congratulations, all partook of a sumptuous dinner, after which the newly wed left for their home in Oregon City. The afternoon was spent in various ways by the old and young. The younger element, especially, kept time to pleasure's chime until the waning twilight gave way to advancing night. The groom is one of Oregon City's most prosperous young men and the bride one of Clackamas county's most estimable young women.

A. O. U. W. AT AURORA—Nearly 500 people attended the open meeting of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, Saturday evening, at Aurora. All who went from this city say it was the greatest meeting they ever attended. Music during the evening was furnished by the Aurora String Band. The solos were exceptionally well-rendered by Miss Miller and others. Addresses were made by Grand Master Wortman, Ralph Feeney, Judge Gordon E. Hayes, J. H. Mosmer and State Organizer H. D. Wagner. The screen work of the order was given, and while they brought tears to the eyes of the spectators, the views were most beautiful. It was by far the largest open meeting ever held in Aurora, people attending from Champeoc, Molalla, Wilsonville, Butteville, Hubbard and for a distance of 10 miles. The meeting was held in the Knights of Pythias hall.

WONDERFUL IF TRUE—Cats come back, sinners sometimes return, curses and chickens come home to roost, and a homing pigeon finds its way to its cot from afar; but the homing instinct of all these animals, including the curses, is, according to the Astorian, thrown in the shade by that of the chinook salmon. Chickens hatched in California from eggs laid in Oregon never came to Oregon to roost, nor would a kitten born in Alaska to a cat raised in Oregon come back within a thousand miles of Oregon. The Astorian states that chinook salmon

hatched in a hatchery on the headwaters of the Sacramento River from eggs collected in Oregon, and marked by cutting off the dorsal fin, have made their way "back" to this state and are now being caught in the Columbia River. This would be wonderful if true, but it is only a joke. As the headwaters of the Sacramento are not far from the Oregon line, it would be easier to believe that the marked fish had come overland to the Columbia than by the roundabout water route.

TURNED HIM LOOSE—Captain E. H. Longley, of Clackamas, was arrested on a charge of insanity Wednesday evening by Sheriff Cooke, on a warrant issued by his wife, Mrs. Flora T. Longley. It is stated that his wife wanted him committed so she could have possession of the property. Capt. Longley, who is a member of the G. A. R., was examined before County Judge Ryan by Dr. W. E. Carl and was represented by Attorney Charles H. Dye. The accused drinks to excess and at times makes violent threats against people whom he imagines are trying to injure him. Dr. Carl said the man's temporary flights are due entirely to his intemperate habits and the judge thought Captain Longley's condition did not warrant sending him to the asylum, so he was accordingly discharged. The captain is 61 years of age.
