THE LOCAL NEWS.

HALF OF THE STATE TAX PAID—County Treasurer Louelling paid \$923.59 into the state treasury Saturday. On May 11 \$400 was paid, making a total of \$12,423.59. The whole state tax was \$24,423.59 and a balance is now due the state of \$12,000.

NEW TARGETS—Company A, Third Regiment, O. N. G., has received 100 targets and markers from headquarters. The company is preparing for their practice march which will be with the Portland companies of the Third regiment some time in July.

AT THE CLACKAMAS HATCHERY—Close to 5,000,000 chinook salmon fry have been turned out at the Clackamas hatchery this spring and the remaining 25,000 were turned out this week. The hatchery still has 250,000 rainbow trout which will be set free later in the spring.

MR. ATKINS' DEPARTURE—Rev. R. O. Atkins, pastor of the M. E. church in this city for the past two years, left Monday morning with his family, for Brooklyn, Indiana. Mr. Atkins was escorted to the depot by a crowd of friends who wished him God speed on his journey and a successful pastorate in Brooklyn.

NEW PORTAL MANAGER—Charles Humphrys has resigned his position as manager of the local office of the Postal Telegraph Company to accept an operator's desk in the Portland branch. His many friends in this city regret his departure but are pleased with his advancement. He left Monday morning to assume his new duties. Mr. N. Damico, of Astoria, succeeds him as manager of the Oregon City office.

VAN ARNEY-HUNTER—Miss Maude Vandrey and Charles Hunter were married Tuesday by City Recorder Bruce C. Corry. They reside in the southern part of the county, near the river, between Oregon City and Butteville. Walter Bernier and Linn E. Jones witnessed the ceremony. Mr. and Mrs. Hunter went to Portland for their honeymoon and after a few days in the giddy whirl will settle down to a quiet and domestic existence in Southern Clackamas.

CENTER STREET IMPROVEMENT—The council met in special session Monday evening to consider the matter of im-

proving Center street from Fifth to Seventh. After some discussion the subject was referred to the committee on streets and public property with instructions to employ an engineer to make estimates of cost of the plans and specifications for the proposed improvement. The committee was also instructed to inspect the track of the railway company on Main street, near Sixth, which was torn up last week to put in new ties, and to see that the bricks were properly replaced. The council also talked over the cleaning of premises.

CHANGE OF VENUE—U'Ren and Schuebel, attorneys for James Ware, have secured a change of venue to Hillsboro and the case will come up for trial at the October term. Ware was driving stage in 1898 between Soda Springs and this city and while going over a road almost impassable from washouts, his team became unmanageable and ran away, injuring him permanently. So he brings suit against the county for \$3000 and cost of medical services. It takes only half an eye to see that a Clackamas county jury would refuse to allow Ware damages against Clackamas county, for they would have to pay some of it themselves. On these grounds a change of venue was asked and granted.

MARY EXCURSIONISTS SUNDAY—The Pomona carried big crowds Sunday between here and Portland and many excursionists took advantage of the beautiful weather to see the falls. Manager Graham has added interest to the trip by running his boats up past the bridge into the spray of the falls. There are but two places in the United States where a trip of this kind is possible. One is at Niagara, and the other at Oregon City; and while Niagara is more famous, it does not usually carry as much water over its brink as is going over the Willamette falls at the present time. The backwater from the Columbia leaves the Willamette practically without current, and a large number of rowboats and launches were strung along the river all the way from Oregon City to Portland, with pleasure-seekers, resting here and there under the trees along the shores.

ASTORIA RATE WAR OVER—The public can no longer enjoy a ride to Astoria for 25 cents. The rates have been raised to \$2 by rail for a single trip and \$2.75 by boat. The round trip fare by rail will be \$3, and \$2.50 by boat. To Long Beach, Nahcotta, Seaside and Gearhart Park the round trip fare will be \$4 by rail or steamer until September 15, when it will probably be increased. An agreement has been entered into whereby the tickets to these points will be interchangeable and can be used either on cars or steamer. The parties to the agreement which goes into effect tomorrow are the Astoria and Columbia River Railway Company, the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company, the Columbia and Puget Sound Navigation Company, and the Vancouver Transportation Company. Fares between Portland and intermediate points will also be adjusted according to the figures herewith.

CARELESS WHEELMEN—The attention of wheelmen is called to the ordinance which prohibits riding on sidewalks. Down town it is observed, but on the hill riders pay little attention to it. Sidewalk wheeling is allowed on any sidewalk on the hill, except Seventh street, but on that street bicyclists must keep off the walks on both sides, and on other streets must dismount within 20 feet of pedestrians. Monday night two children were knocked down by a scorcher and had to be carried home and a woman was run into the same day on Seventh street. Wheelmen are becoming careless here as in Portland. Sunday evening an aged woman from Oregon City, accompanied by her daughter, got off a Mount Tabor car to take the Oregon City car at the corner of East Eleventh street and Hawthorne avenue, when a wheelman ran into her. She she was thrown on her face with great force and a long gash cut in her

forehead, from which the blood flowed freely. Bystanders picked her up and bound up the wound, and she was able to proceed on her trip. Mayor Dimick proposes to see that the bicycle law in this city is strictly enforced.

OREGON CITY WON.

Waxed Stephens' Addition at Willamette Sunday to the Tune of 8 to 5.

Nearly 1000 people saw an exciting game of baseball on Willamette Falls field last Sunday afternoon between Company A, team of this city and Stephens' Addition nine from Portland. The game was closely followed with great interest. Stephens' led until the fifth inning, when the home team tied the score and made four runs in the sixth, while Belt held the visitors down to one run after the third inning. Great things were expected of Ray but the home boys found him early and easy and Siebels was substituted in the fifth, but Company A doubled their score in the next inning.
