Council Meets Wednesday Evening and Transacts Business.

LIGHT QUESTION IS DISCUSSED.

Unless Portland General Electric Company Furnishes Arcs for \$6.50 City Will be in Darkness.

Oregon City's council met Wednesday evening. A number of bills were read and the report of Linn E. Jones, city treasurer, was accepted.

The report of Chief Hartman of the Fire Department was referred to committee on Fire and Water with power to act. The report states the condition of apparatus and recommends that moss on roof of house be removed; that the hydrant on Main and sixth streets be repaired as it is not in working order and that the 150 feet of hose belonging to the city which is now being repaired by Pope & Co. be given to the street department.

Petition of Geo. H. Karnes to open an alley through block 82 was referred to committee on streets and public property with power to act.

Remonstrance against improvement of Center Street, between Fifth and Seventh, was read and it was ordered that the city should not proceed with the improvement.

Ordered that the committee on streets and public property wait 10 days and if the city cannot get arc lights for \$6.50 per light, the committee notify the Portland General Electric Company that the city will dispense with their lights immediately.

Ordered that recorder be instructed to notify Portland General Electric Company that the council is of the opinion that the basin at the head of Main street is in bad condition and that the company would be held liable to damage to property if the bulkhead should break.

Circuit Court.

An adjourned term of the circuit court convened Monday. A brief summary of the orders entered are given.

Lizzie Vorpahl was granted a divorce from Herman Vorpahl. They reside in Canby. Mrs. Vorpahl was awarded the custody of the four children, Arthur, aged 11; Lydas, aged 10; Edna, aged 4 and Walter, aged 5 months. The court also ordered that Vorpahl pay costs and disbursements.

Anna Shear and Elmer F. Shear were divorced. Mrs. Shear was represented by Attorney J. F. Boothe and allowed to resume her maiden name of Nagle. The couple were married April 13, 1899 in Reno, Nevada.

In the matter of the assignment of E. M. Atkinson, an insolvent debtor, order was made confirming the sale of lots 4 and 5 in block 17, Park addition to Oregon City, to Delbert Hart. Newton Me-

August Krause sued the Oregon Iron & Steel company. He alleged the company erected a dam across the Tualatin river in 1888, causing the back water to flow over his land and asked \$100 damages and costs. The court entered a decree for the plaintiff whose attorneys were C. M. Edleman and L. R. Webster. Drosser and Brownell represented the company.

In the suit of G. F. Gibbs against Mrs. M. J. Boen, A. Boen, Doc Boen and Nicholas Jonas, surety on appeal bonds of defendants, the jury rendered a judgment for \$24.98 against Mrs. M. J. Boen but did not find against the other defendants. The case was dismissed and a decree entered against Mrs. Boen and Jonas. W. S. U'Ren, attorney for plaintiffs and Hedges & Griffith for defendants.

Annie Bell was granted a divorce from Thos. Bell, and allowed to resume her maiden name of Chapman. The testimony was taken by Referee C. E. Runyon. They were married in Oakland Feb. 26, 1896.
