THE LOCAL NEWS.

O. N. G. AT WILHOIT SPRINGS.—The Third Regiment, Oregon National Guard will go into camp at Wilhoit Springs, July 7, and remain until July 9. There will be dress parade, guard mount and military maneuvers each day, with dancing and fireworks in the evening. Admission to the grounds on this occasion 25 cents. Children under 12 years, free.

FOOTBALLS COMING SUNDAY.—Next Sunday Company A time will line up against their old antagonists, the Fontellas, on Willamette Falls field. Game will be called at 2:30 p. m. sharp. A return game will be played in Portland on the first Sunday that is open to both teams. Manager Humphrey is trying to arrange a game with the Chemawa Indians to be played some Saturday in July.

JULY FOURTH AT DANAMUS.—One of the biggest and best celebrations in the country will be held on July 4th at Danamus, in Kimbley's Park, by Danamus Camp, Modern Woodmen of America. Grand parade at 10:30 a. m., led by the Parkside band. Reading of the Declaration of Independence by Mrs. William Bachman. Oration by Senator Geo. C. Brownell. Address by Senator John H. Mitchell. Cake walk, bicycle and other races. Every body is invited and a rousing time is promised.

TUBERCULOSIS CAUSES DEATH.—Mrs. Mattie Morgensen died at Montavilla last Thursday morning of tuberculosis of the stomach. Her age was 34 years. The funeral was held Friday from Holman's undertaking parlors, and the interment was in Mountain View cemetery. Her husband died suddenly of pneumonia about two months ago. He was a member of the A. O. U. W. and left considerable property. One little girl is left, who will be taken care of by relatives.

GRAHAM-TREASON.—Miss Clara A. Graham, daughter of J. K. Graham, a prominent farmer of Carus, was married Tuesday morning in this city to John R. Treason. The ceremony was performed by Judge Ryan at the residence of L. Horschur in the presence of immediate friends and relatives. After receiving the congratulations of those present, the happy couple left for Portland, where they will reside. Mr. Treason is connected with the Pacific States Telephone Company, as an electrician and met his wife while putting up a line at Carus.

MOTORMAN INJURED.—A. R. Dimick, a motorman on the P. C. & O. R. R. met with a serious accident Sunday night, in Portland. He was standing between two cars to couple them and signaled to the motorman for two feet. A newsboy who was passing, yelled "six feet," and the motorman, thinking it was Dimick's signal, backed his car swiftly, the coupling catching Dimick and smashing his elbow. His side was also severely bruised. His injuries are painful but he will be able to return to work in a week or two.

DIED FROM HIS INJURIES.—Geo. W. Losey died last Thursday, June 29 at the home of his daughter in Salem, from injuries received by falling from a roof. Mr. Losey was born in Ohio in 1833 and went in early childhood with his parents to Iowa; in 1871 to Kansas and to Oregon in 1880. Mr. Losey had 12 children, eight of whom survive him. They are: George H. of Oswego, Chas. and Lewis, of West Oregon City; Percy and Mrs. Howard Savage, of Anity; Mrs. George Gosser, of Salem; Mrs. Berry Grammer, of La. Camas, Wash. and Mrs. Mina Bond, of Arizona. All were with him in his last hours except Mrs. Bond, of Arizona. He was buried in the Odd Fellows cemetery in Salem.

MACCABEES AT WRIGHT'S SPRING.—The Fourth of July celebration at Wright's Springs given by the Maccabees promises to be a great success. Hundreds of people will be present from all parts of the country. There will be games and races of every description including a quarter mile horse race. The musical program will be a feature. Frank Confer will sing several solos and a quartet, composed of Messrs. Norris, Taylor, Confer and Gilstrap will render a number of songs. Mrs. Hiram Straight will read the Declaration of Independence and Henry St. Rayner, of Portland will be the orator. Senator Geo. C. Brownell is slated for an address. The Maccabees are sparing no pains or expense to eclipse other celebrations.

OREGON ENDEAVOR UNION.—Rev. A. J. Montgomery, pastor of the Presbyterian church is transportation manager for the International Christian Endeavor Convention, to be held in Cincinnati, July 6-10. Mr. Montgomery is unable to attend but is doing all he can to make the excursion from Oregon a success. A large number of endeavorers have announced their intention of going. A round trip rate of \$75.50 from Portland, has been offered, tickets good July 1st, 2nd and 3rd. A special organ recital at the Mormon tabernacle has been arranged and an opportunity to a drive through quaint and picturesque Salt Lake City, and a dip in the great Salt Lake will be afforded during the stop at the Mormon capital.

DROWNED IN THE WILLAMETTE.—Albert McFarland, the nine-year-old son of J. A. McFarland, was drowned Friday afternoon in the river. He was in bathing with his playmates and endeavoring to swim by the aid of a plank, which he was astride, when out from shore about 40 feet he lost his balance and fell into the water, sinking in about 15 feet of water. The alarm was given and James Young dived for the body and recovered it, but the boy had been so long in the water as to make resuscitation impossible. The funeral was held from the Presbyterian church Sunday afternoon, Rev. A. J. Montgomery conducting the service. The local lodge of United Artisans, of which the boy's father is a member, attended the funeral.

Oregon City Defeated Vancouver by a Score of Nine to Eight.

Vancouver went down to defeat last Sunday afternoon in a closely contested game with Company A on Willamette Falls field. The clouds were threatening but the few drops that fell did not dampen the ardor of the fans. A large crowd witnessed the game, excursions coming from Vancouver and McMinnville.

The visitors started out bravely with two runs and added another in the third inning and Oregon City tied the score. No one tallied after the third until the last half of the fifth when Vancouver substituted Forsyth for Kane in the box and the home team piled up six runs. But during the rest of the game Forsyth settled down and Company A made no more. The Washington boys added two runs in the seventh and three in the ninth, making the score 9-8. Attention Water Consumers.

Rate for sprinkling or irrigation in addition to household or other use, is \$1 for the season of 1901, PAYABLE JUNE 1. This includes use of hose during the year.

Rate where water is not used for other purposes shall be \$2 per month or \$5 for the season, from May 1st to October 1st, payable in advance.

Hours for sprinkling or irrigation are from 5 to 9 o'clock morning and evening only.

No consumer will be permitted to sprinkle or irrigate the premises of another, unless the regular charge has been paid.

An excessive use of water will not be permitted.

For a disregard of rules and regulations, governing the use of water the service may be shut off without further notice.
