J. U. Campbell, guardian ad litem, of the minor heirs of the estate of J. L. Cochran, deceased, reported a sale of real estate necessary and for the best interests of the estate and an order was accordingly issued for the sale of tracts of land valued at \$2050.

The claim of Charles Harnock against the county for \$100 damages, for injuries sustained in a runaway on the county road between Canby and Mackburg March 10, on account of a defective culvert, has been disallowed. Harnock had his leg broken in the accident.

In the estate of J. L. Cochran, deceased, the administrator filed a petition asking authority to sell real estate. The court appointed J. U. Campbell guardian ad litem of John E. Cochran and Charles Cochran, minor heirs and instructed him to report to the court the necessity, if any there is, why property should be sold.

The clerk of the Board of County Commissioners has been directed to issue an order to the Oregon City & Southern Railway Company that it must repair the county road between Oregon City and Canemah, on which its line is built, and that it would be held responsible for all damages accruing from such neglect.

The total fees in the county clerk's office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1901, were \$2,918.35; an increase of \$635.25 over the previous year.

In the circuit court Saturday Stenographer Kunyon was appointed referee to take testimony in the divorce proceedings of Nellie Cook vs. Baymond W. Cook.

Carrie E. Busby, whose maiden name was Carrie E. Hilliard, has applied for a divorce from Lester Busby. They were married in Vancouver, Wash., March 22, 1899. Hedgus & Griffith are attorneys for plaintiff.

In the estate of W. A. Stephens, deceased, the administrator was ordered to sell personal property of the estate, which is of less value than \$350, excepting a claim against the Oregon City Pulp & Paper Company for \$271.

The final report of Frank Ford, administrator of the estate of Lucius A. Seely was held Tuesday in the county court showing a balance of \$1,934.15, the major portion of which goes to the administrator of the estate of Sophia H. Ford.
