THE LOCAL NEWS.

A little son of James Smith, living on Clackamas Heights, Oregon, with an ax Monday, when he fell, the ax falling on his leg, between the knee and ankle, a severe gash nearly an inch deep. A physician was called in and the wound. The boy is getting steadily and will soon recover.

ALL TAXPAYERS, except the Portland Electric Company, have their taxes. The last to come in is the Portland Flour Mills Company. The county treasury was made richer by their contribution. It is expected that the P. G. Co. will pay in a short time. They assessed at over \$14,000.

MR. WHITE'S SPRINGS.—Mr. White was in the city Monday. He is at Wright's Springs and in company with Mr. White started threshing. White and Woodside are the owners of two large farms at Wright's Springs. Mr. Woodside says the crops are doing fine and the yield in that section will be fully one third more than last year.

GREENMAN WAS REMOVED.—A man from Astoria, Oregon, was removed from the Oregonian from Astoria. Greenman, removed. H. C. Austen was for several years connected with the Clackamas hatchery, has been appointed a deputy of the Fish Warden assigned to duties on the Siuslaw River.

PRESIDENT OF THE electric line, and a number of friends came up from Portland Monday afternoon in a private car. Trip was made in 45 minutes, an improvement of 25 minutes over the regular time, which is one hour and 10 minutes. About September first a 50-mile schedule will be inaugurated, cutting 20 minutes off of the regular time, equaling the time of Southern Railway.

GENERAL CONFERENCE.—General W. Gilbert Beattie, of the Christian Association, has issued an invitation to the Y. M. C. A. of Oregon and Idaho, which will take place in Portland August 24 and 25. The conference is held annually to discuss association problems and it is expected that everyone of the 20 secretaries in the three states will be present. At last year's conference only three were absent.

NEW COUNTY PHYSICIAN.—Dr. C. E. Stuart has been appointed county physician, and succeeds Drs. Norris and Powell. He has been in Oregon City but a short time and is rapidly building up a lucrative practice. Dr. Stuart graduated from the medical department of Willamette University about four years ago and located at Buena Vista where he practiced a year and then moved to Woodburn. After spending two years there he came to Oregon City two months ago and secured offices in the Willamette building. Dr. Stuart's success is gratifying to the newer and more vigorous school of physicians.

BOTH UNDER AGE.—A young man and a maiden fair walked into the county clerk's office Monday and demanded a marriage license. Mr. Cooper thought they had a tender appearance and upon questioning them found they were both under the legal age and accordingly he could not issue a license to them, unless their parents or guardians requested it. The man swallowed his disappointment manfully but the girl took it hard. She said her mother lived in Missouri and that she had earned her own living since she had been a mere child. Her name is Buckbee. The way out of the difficulty would be for the man to obtain the consent of his parents, who live in this county, and a guardian could be appointed for the young lady and he could consent to her marriage.
