Surrenders Its Charter.

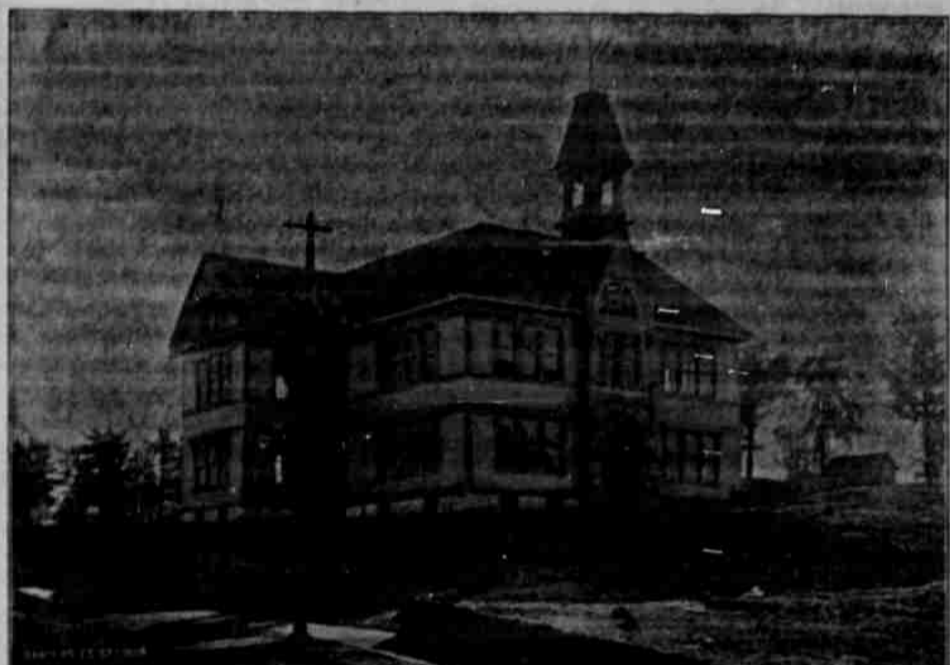
Meade Post, No. 2, G. A. R., held its

## CLERK'S EXHIBIT

Condition of Clackamas County  
at the End of the Year.

NEARLY \$80,000 WAS EXPENDED  
The Statement Shows That \$50,125.23  
Was Appropriated for Roads  
and Bridges.

The financial exhibit of County Clerk  
Cooper for the fiscal year ending June  
30, 1901, has been completed. The li-  
abilities of the county are \$173,658.29,  
which is the amount of outstanding war-  
rants with interest. The resources are

ers, though those of the Willamettes

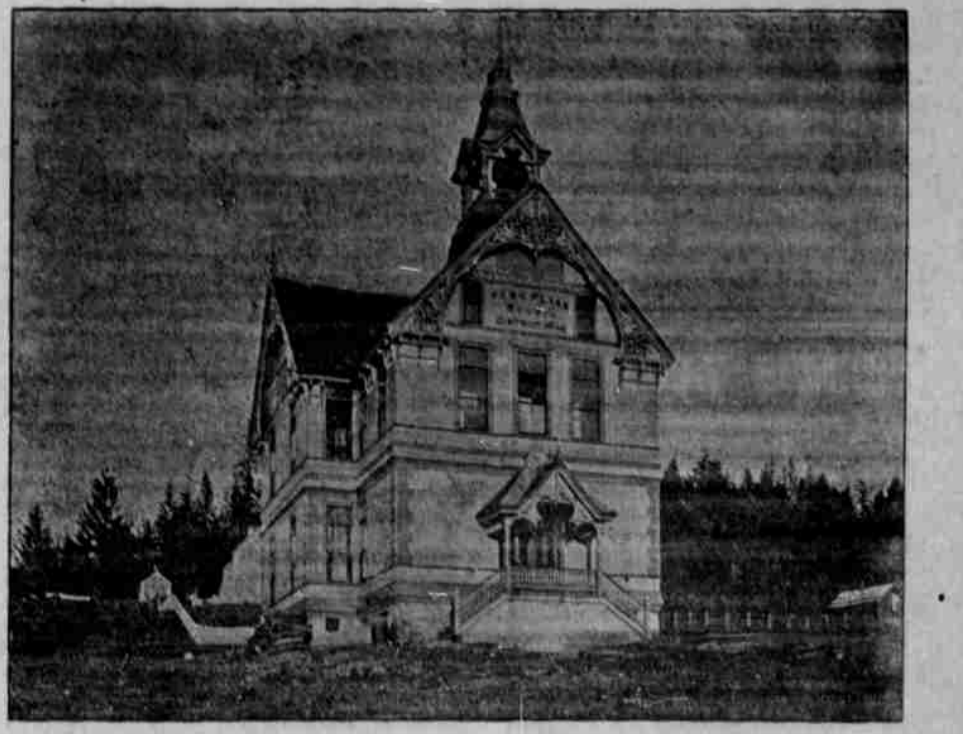
John Gibbon Post, No. 78, Department  
of Oregon, is no more, its charter having  
been annulled by Department Com-  
mander A. J. Goodbrod, with the con-  
sent of the council of administration.  
The post was organized last October by  
a few members, and since then the or-  
ganization has not been a success. It is  
believed the majority of the members  
will soon join the Meade Post. Follow-  
ing is an extract from general orders,  
No. 2:  
"The charter of John Gibbon Post,  
No. 78, Department of Oregon, Grand  
Army of Republic, having been annulled  
on June 25, 1901, by Department Com-  
mander A. J. Goodbrod, with the con-  
sent of the council of administration,  
and the same having been approved by  
Leo Rasseur, commander-in-chief G. A.  
R., on July 31, 1901, under section 4,  
article 1, of charter 5, rules and regula-  
tions, John Gibbon Post, No. 78, Depart-  
ment of Oregon, G. A. R., is hereby  
dropped from the rolls of this depart-  
ment, and all comrades of said John  
Gibbon Post, No. 78, who were in good  
standing on June 25, 1901, will be  
granted cards upon application to these  
headquarters."
