AN EVENING COLLEGE.

Y. M. C. A. Will Conduct a Night School This Winter.

This Young Men's Christian Association has determined to conduct its own night school during the coming winter. A faculty of competent and experienced instructors will be secured.

The first step in entering any of these classes is to become a member of the Association (initiation fee \$1.00; dues, \$5 a year).

The classes will meet twice each week; some of them on Monday and Thursday evenings, the others on Tuesday and Friday evenings.

Oregon's wheat crop will be larger than that of last year. There is a slight decrease in the yield of Columbia river counties but a good crop in the Willamette valley will increase the total.
