CITY SCHOOLS ARE OPENED

Attendance Shows Small Increase Over Last Year.

FORTY-FIVE IN THE HIGH SCHOOL

Strenuous Objection to the Vertical System of Penmanship Developed.

Oregon City's schools opened Monday with a very good attendance. The increase over last year is not great, but it is probable more students will register next week. The high school has 45 students in the three grades. Recitations have been scheduled and things are running smoothly. Some trouble is experienced in transferring pupils from one building to the other, but this cannot be avoided, as the eighth grade has been changed from the Eastham to the Barclay building, and the seventh grade from the Barclay to the Eastham.

Teachers are making complaint against the vertical system of penmanship. Six years ago the slant style of writing was introduced, and three years later the vertical style was adopted. This year still another system of vertical writing was authorized, and teachers will soon be able to write Egyptian hieroglyphics with accuracy and precision.
