HURST WILL REBUILD.

New Aurora Roller Mills To Be Constructed in the Spring.

Poultry Notes.

Young fowls need crushed bone in some form to develop good blood, bone and feathers.

If you can get it chop up corn or other greens into half-inch lengths and mix with the mash.

A gill of linseed oil mixed with ground grain if given to six hens is the best and cheapest medicine for bowel disease.

Turkeys must have a good range to be profitable. They are good foragers and insect destroyers, but must have plenty of room.

If turkeys are fed regularly once a day near the house, they will form a habit of coming home at that hour, however large their range.

Keep the hens with a reasonably sharp appetite and they will lay more eggs, which will hatch better and produce stronger chickens.

The man who expects turkeys to make their own living, may expect them to find their own roosting place and give him trouble to control them.

Very young chicks cannot consume enough food to last long, hence they should be fed often. After they are ten days old the young chicks should be fed at least four times a day.
