STATE OF OREGON.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. SALEM, October 14, 1901. In accordance with the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act submitting to the electors of the state of Oregon, at the general election to be held on the first Monday in June, 1902, the proposed Constitutional Amendment, approved February 23, 1901, I, T. T. Geer, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby cause the following proposed amendment, designated as "Initiative and Referendum Amendment" to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, as certified to by the Secretary of State, to be published for five consecutive weeks in the Oregon City Enterprise, a newspaper published in the Fifth Judicial District of the State of Oregon.

Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be, and the same hereby is, proposed:

Section 4 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be, and hereby is, amended to read as follows:

Section 1. The legislative authority of the state shall be vested in a legislative assembly, consisting of a Senate and a House of Representatives, but the people reserve to themselves the power to propose laws and amendments to the constitution and to enact or reject the same at the polls, independent of the legislative assembly, and also reserve power at their own option to approve or reject at the polls any action of the legislative assembly.

The people shall have the right to initiate and referendum, and to recall judges and officers of the state, and to amend the constitution, and to propose laws and amendments to the constitution, and to enact or reject the same at the polls, independent of the legislative assembly, and also reserve power at their own option to approve or reject at the polls any action of the legislative assembly.
