AMESUMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF OREGON.
Resolved by the House, the Senate con-

That the following amenment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be, and the same hereby is, proposed: Section 1 of Article 1V of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be, and hereby is, amended to read as follows: Section 1. The legislative authority of the state shall be vested in a legislative assembly, consisting of a Senate and a House of Representatives, but the people reserve to themselves power to process laws and amendments to the constitution and to enact or reject the same at the poils, inde-dendent of the legislative assembly, and also reserve power at their own option to approve or reject at the poils any action of the legislative assembly. The first power the legislative assembly. The first power reserved by the people is the initiative, and not more than eight per cent, of the legal voters shall be required to process any measure by such petition, and every such petition shall include the full text of the measure so proposed. Initiative petitions shall be filed with the Secretary of State not less than four months before the election which they are to be voted upon. second power is the reterement in the public be ordered (except as to laws necessary for the public the lasm-diate preservation of the public peace, health or safety), either by the petivoters or by the legislative assembly, as other bills are enacted. Referendum petitions shall be filed with the Secretary State not more than ninery days after the adjournment of the session of the legislative assembly which passed the bill on which the referentiam is demanded. The veto power of the Governor shall not exto measures referred to the people. All elections on measures referred to the people of the state shall be had at the beensial regular general elections, except when

the legislative assembly shall order a spe-

cial election. Any measure referred to the people shall take effect and become the law when it is approved by a majority of the votes cast thereon, and not otherwise. The style of all bills ahalf be, "Be it enacted by the people of the State of Oregon." This section shall not be construed to deprive any member of the legislative assembly of the right to introduce any measure. The whole number of votes cast for Justice of
