In accordance with the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act submitting to the electors of the state of Oregon, at the general election to be held on the first Monday in June, 1902, the pending proposed Constitutional Amendment, approved February 23, 1901, I, T. T. Geer, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby cause the following proposed amendment, designated as "Initiative and Referendum Amendment" to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, as certified by the Secretary of State, to be published for five consecutive weeks in the Oregon City Enterprise, a newspaper published in the Fifth Judicial District of the State of Oregon. Done at the Capitol, at Salem, Oregon, this 14th day of October, A. D. 1901. T. T. GEER, Governor.

(L. S.) By the Governor: F. L. DUNBAR, Secretary of State. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1. (of the Twenty-first Biennial Session.) AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF OREGON.

Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be, and the same hereby is, proposed:

Section 1 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be, and hereby is, amended to read as follows: Section 1. The legislative authority of the state shall be vested in a legislative assembly, consisting of a Senate and a House of Representatives, but the people reserve to themselves power to propose laws and amendments to the constitution and to enact or reject the same at the polls, independent of the legislative assembly, and also reserve power at their own option to approve or reject at the polls any action of the legislative assembly. The first power reserved by the people is the initiative, and not more than eight per cent. of the legal voters shall be required to propose any measure by such petition, and every such petition shall include the full text of the measure so proposed. Initiative petitions shall be filed with the Secretary of State not less than four months before the election at which they are to be voted upon. The second power is the referendum, and it may be ordered (except as to laws necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety) either by the petition signed by five per cent. of the legal voters or by the legislative assembly, as other bills are enacted. Referendum petitions shall be filed with the Secretary of State not more than ninety days after the adjournment of the session of the legislative assembly which passed the bill on which the referendum is demanded. The veto power of the Governor shall not extend to measures referred to the people. All elections on measures referred to the people of the state shall be had at the biennial regular general elections, except when the legislative assembly shall order a special election. Any measure referred to the people shall take effect and become the law when it is approved by a majority of the votes cast thereon, and otherwise. The style of all bills shall be, "Be it enacted by the people of the State of Oregon." This section shall not be construed to deprive any member of the legislative assembly of the right to introduce any measure. The whole number of votes cast for Justice of the Supreme Court at the regular election last preceding the filing of any petition for the initiative or for the referendum shall be the basis on which the number of legal voters necessary to such petition, shall be counted. Petitions and orders for the initiative and for the referendum shall be filed with the Secretary of State, and in submitting the same to the people he and all other officers shall be guided by the general laws and the act submitting this amendment, until legislation shall be especially provided therefor.

Around the Court House.

A suit was filed Monday by the Portland City & Oregon Railway against Dora Quant for the condemnation of a strip of land in Milwaukie which the company wishes to use for a roadbed when their contemplated change of route is made. The Court is asked to fix the damages as the parties are unable to agree on the same.

Alice Siak has sued Jerry Siak for divorce. They were married in Portland, February 14, 1898. The plaintiff alleges cruel and inhuman treatment and non-support, and says that the defendant tried to induce her to go to San Francisco and enter a house of prostitution. She also asks to be allowed to resume her maiden name of Alice V. Osborn.

Mary E. Deady has brought suit against Charles N. Wait to recover the sum of \$400 with 8 per cent interest from December 8, 1900, due on a promissory note. Plaintiff alleges that in June, 1900, at Canby, Wait delivered to T. W. Sparks his certain promissory note payable in six months after date. Before the maturity of the note, Sparks sold, endorsed and delivered the note to plaintiff, who is now owner and holder thereof. Forty dollars is asked as attorney fees.
