THE LOCAL NEWS.

DIED.—At Milwaukie, Oct. 26, Mrs. Teresa Ernstberger, aged 56 years. Services were held at Milwaukie Catholic church. Interment at Milwaukie cemetery. She was a resident of Milwaukie for a number of years. She leaves two daughters and one son.

FIRST GRAND-DAUGHTER.—The Women's Relief Corps, of this city, has presented the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson McKillean with a solid silver cup, in honor of her being the first grand daughter of any member of the Corps. In recognition of the gift the Relief Corps have been asked to name the baby.

SCARLET FEVER SCARE.—The Park-place school closed Monday morning on account of scarlet fever in the neighborhood and will not re-open until all danger of contagion is past. The four-year-old son of Chas. Smith, whose residence is next to the school building, is ill with the disease and Archibald, the two-year-old son of Mr. Smith, died Sunday. The funeral took place Monday afternoon, Rev. A. J. Montgomery officiating at the ceremonies.

INDIAN SUMMER OVER.—The balmy breezes of October are past and the wind now howls furiously in their stead. With the passing of Friday the good weather of the past three weeks went also, and Saturday ushered in a storm of wind and rain. The gentlemen from the country and the river steamer men are rejoicing over the dampness and we, the towns are quick to acknowledge the goodness of the rain.

WILHELM WAS WORTH \$11,000.—The will of John G. Wilhelm, deceased, has been admitted to probate. The estate is valued at \$11,000. To the widow, Mary A. Wilhelm, is devised the homestead, and also the remainder of the property to devise and bequeath as she sees fit. She is also empowered to sell and convey the same. But if she remarries, her interest in the property shall cease and shall rest in the six children, who are named. The widow in that event may continue in possession of the property as trustee for the children. The desire is expressed that she shall continue to carry on the business, and the same be carried on by the sons when they become of age.

COURT MARTIAL OF CO. A MEMBERS.—Company A, Third Regiment, O. N. G., will be inspected next Monday evening by Major VonEggelstein. Members of the company are considerably excited over an order for a general court martial of about 30 members of the company for neglect of duty in failing to attend drills. The detail of the court will probably comprise Lieutenant-Colonel Raymond Jubitz and Major VonEggelstein. No-

lice will be served on each of the offenders and if he fails to appear he will be taken into custody by the sheriff, who is summoned to appear for that purpose. There is very little doubt but that the men will be found guilty and the punishment is generally fixed by a fine of fifty cents or one dollar for each time drill is missed. Should the fine not be paid the men must do time in the county jail, one day imprisonment for every two dollars fine. Company A is organizing basketball and indoor baseball teams and expect to form a football team.

HUMANITY SOCIETY MEETS.—The annual meeting of the Clackamas County Humane Society was held Monday evening in the parlors of the bank of Oregon City. The following officers were re-elected: President, Miss Anieta McCarver; Vice-president, George A. Harding; Secretary, Rev. A. J. Montgomery, Treasurer, E. G. Canfield; Directors for three years, W. A. Huntley, E. G. Canfield, A. J. Montgomery. The reports of the officers show the past year to have been a very prosperous one and speaks well for Oregon City and vicinity. During the past year there has been but one case of arrest or conviction for cruelty to animals. Some complaints have been made against offenders and in each case where an officer of the society has investigated the charge the offender has promised to treat his animals in a more humane manner. People who are in a position to know say that the society has accomplished much. It is the intention of the society to establish a drinking fountain at a public place in this city. The money for this purpose is derived from membership fees, and contributions are not solicited, though the society would be very grateful for any amount contributed.

MR. CARTER DENIES IT

Says Salmon Were Not Sold By Men In His Employ.

HOW THE REPORT WAS STARTED

In One Case a Tip Was Accepted.—Superintendent Stopped This and It Has Not Occurred Since.

Much has been said concerning the alleged sale of fish at the Clackamas Hatchery spawning grounds to people who in previous seasons were given the salmon free. The Oregonian of October 20 contained the following letter signed by W. P. Bamber, of Parkplace:

"The fish hatchery here on the Clackamas is becoming little more than an open fish market. The fish, after being spawned, have always heretofore been given to the people free of charge. Now, however, it is different. Every one getting fish must 'produce.' I have the names of 15 different men who had to pay for fish this morning in order to get them. If the requisite amount of cash is not forthcoming from the people on the bank the dead fish are dumped into the river forthwith, which is a violation of the law, endangering the health of us who live on the banks of the river below, some of whom are compelled to use the water for household purposes. Now, whether the officials in charge are acquainted with the facts or not, they should be, and these practices brought at once to an end."

In the Evening Telegram of the following day appeared this statement:

"Many complaints have been made of late of the unlawful distribution of salmon after being spawned, in Oregon City and throughout Clackamas County. Salmon, when spawned, are killed and are unfit to eat; yet persons are gathering up these dead fish and selling them, which is a violation of the state fish law. Persons selling these rotten fish are very careful in preparing them for sale. When a salmon is spawned it resembles more of a decayed fish than anything else. Before selling them the heads are cut off and the scales scraped, and then the fish are cut into pieces. One person, residing at Parkplace, makes a complaint that the fish, after being spawned, have always heretofore been given to the people free of charge, but he has the names of 15 different men who were obliged to pay for fish in order to get them. He states that if the requisite amount of cash is not forthcoming from the people on the bank, the dead fish are dumped into the river, which is also a violation of the law. A number of persons have been sick for the past week eating these diseased fish, and besides it is hurting the fish trade of Oregon City. The officials in charge of the hatchery are probably not to blame, but it seems they could put a stop to this unlawful distribution of these fish."

Mr. Carter comes to the front with the following defense. He probed the matter to the bottom and unearthed the facts concerning the report and its foundation. Hundreds of people come to the hatchery for salmon. It is hard to believe that anyone can eat the fish, particularly anyone who has seen a spawned salmon, nevertheless the hatchery officials are besieged with requests for more fish than they catch. A number of these people were camped on the bank near the pens where the spawning is done. Some of them disturbed the owner of the land, Mr. A. Bolle, milked his cows, and were finally refused admittance to his premises, so were com-

elled afterwards to wait on the opposite bank until the spawning was over, when the fish were delivered to them by one of the fishermen. One morning after the government crew of fishermen had worked all night, the fish were left in a boat, the crew first intending to eat breakfast. But as the people camped on the opposite bank were in a hurry to go home they offered the fishermen a small sum of money to bring the fish to the shore, which was done. When the transaction came to the ears of the superintendent he ordered that tipping should cease. It was also ascertained that in all cases where fish were thrown in the river after they were killed, it was by people who took the salmon. It should be understood that the tipping of the men delivering the spawned fish was started by the parties receiving them and was not demanded or exacted by the fishermen. It has been stated that much of the salmon given away is being peddled over the country. This is very much to be regretted but the fish are given to all alike and it is impossible to know who the peddlers are.
