AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE
STATE OF GREGON.

Resolved by the House, the Senate conarring: That the following amenment to the Con-

same hereby is, proposed:
Section I of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be, and hereby is, amended to read as follows:
Section I. The legislative authority of Oregon

the state shall be vested in a legislative as-sembly, consisting of a Senate and a House of Representatives, but the people reserve to themselves power to propose laws and amendments to the constitution and to enact or reject the same at the polls, inde-dendent of the legislative assembly, and also reserve power at their own option to approve or reject at the polls any action of the legislative assembly. The first power reserved by the people is the initiative, and roters shall be required to propose any measure by such petition, and every such petition shall include the full text of the measure so proposed. Initiative petitions shall be filed with the Secretary of State not less than four mouths before the election at which they are to be voted upon. The second power is the referendum, and it may be ordered (except as to laws necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or salety), either by the petipeace, health or safety), either by the pention signed by five per cent. of the legal voters or by the legislative assembly, as other bits are enacted.
