POINDEXTER'S BAD BREAK

Was Guilty of a Serious Breach of Discipline.

CAUSED HIM SOME TROUBLE LATER

When He Tried to Secure a Commission His Actions in the Philippines Were an Impediment.

The New York Sun of November 5 contains a dispatch about the marriage of Lieutenant Poindexter, who went from Oregon City as a private in Company I, Second Oregon Volunteer Infantry, to the Philippines. The incident related to created quite a stir in the regiment in the winter of 1898 while the army was yet in Manila before the outbreak of hostilities. The dispatch says: "The marriage today in Christ church in Alexandria, Va., of Miss Charlotte Thornton Mason, daughter of Col Roy Mason, of Fredericksburg, Va., and Lieut. Fielding Lewis Poindexter, U. S. A., brought to light another instance where President Roosevelt has cut red tape to do a sensible, kindly act. Lieut. Poindexter served in the Volunteer army during the Spanish war and made a most creditable record for himself. Some months ago he was designated for appointment as a Second Lieutenant in the Regular Army and passed a successful examination. When it came to actual appointment, however, the War Department officials demurred on the ground that there was some slight breach of discipline charged against him, trivial, it was true, but nevertheless enough to hold up his commission. Young Poindexter tried for weeks to have the matter righted, and the wedding was put off in consequence. "On Wednesday last one of his friends went to President Roosevelt, explained the circumstances and asked that some action be taken. The President called on the War Department for the papers in the case and asked the official who brought them what the charge was against the young officer. Upon being told it was that Lieut. Poindexter, just after his appointment in the Volunteer army, had not risen and saluted his superior officer when the latter entered the room, Mr. Roosevelt, remarking that a young man without an army training could not at once be expected to know all the army regulations, directed the issue of his commission. The next day the commission was made out, Poindexter was sworn in, and the date of the wedding fixed for today."

The truth about the breach of discipline and courtesy toward a superior officer is more serious than is indicated above. A few weeks before Christmas a few soldiers, with the assistance of some of the officers, circulated a paper among the business men of Manila, soliciting subscriptions for a Christmas dinner to be given to the sick soldiers in the hospitals. The Spanish, French and German merchants responded liberally with offers of money, but evidently the giving was not as spontaneous as it might have been under different circumstances. The Americans were the conquerors of the city and the merchants felt that a liberal contribution was required to purchase the friendship and protection of the soldiers. When this matter came to the attention of Gen. Otis, that officer issued an order forbidding the contribution to be proceeded with farther and directing that all money collected be returned. Poindexter, one of the committee having the matter in charge, on the issuance of the order, went to the quarters of General Otis to remonstrate with him for putting into effect the order. When ushered into the General's room at the palace, Poindexter saw that the General was engaged, so he took a seat near by. This, of course, was a breach of courtesy due the Military Governor, but probably would have been overlooked by the General, if Poindexter had not attempted to dissuade the Governor from the course he had pursued toward the Christmas dinner collection.

Poindexter was on guard duty that day and had disregarded an order that no guard should leave the guard house when off his post, being expected to be on duty at the guard house when not walking his beat. This was a breach of discipline also that required rebuke. Poindexter was sent to the guard house where he awaited a general court martial for several months. He was discharged at the breaking out of hostilities.
