AROUND THE COURT HOUSE

H. H. Johnson and Henry Meldrum have filed an answer in the suit of A. E. Latourette, trustee, against H. H. Johnson, Henry Meldrum, Thomas Charman, and J. T. Apperson, in which they allege that H. H. Johnson turned over to the agents of the plaintiff the amount received from the U. S. POWER OF THE CLACKAMAS

Will Be Used By the Oregon General Electric Company.

NEW CORPORATION IS FORMED

Primary Object Is to Transmit Power But a Rail Way Line May Be Constructed.

A deed was filed Monday in the county recorder's office by Fred S. Morris, conveying to the Oregon General Electric Company 499.66 acres adjoining the Clackamas. This property is about 20 miles up the Clackamas and will be utilized by the Oregon General Electric Company, which was incorporated last week by Fred S. Morris, J. Frank Watson, A. B. Crossman and William T. Blair, with a capital stock of \$2,000,000.

The purposes of the corporation are to conduct the business of generating, transmitting, furnishing and selling of electricity for the purpose of lighting and power, and to furnish and sell to persons, corporations, towns or cities, electricity for illuminating purposes, railways, engines, etc. They are also to acquire, improve and operate locks, canals and basins in the State of Oregon; to construct and equip street railways and electric lines in Portland, Clackamas County and elsewhere.

The new company will erect their power plant on the Clackamas River, and transmit the power about 20 miles to Portland. The plant, which will cost between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000, will be in operation within the next two years.

The company is making extensive plans. The entire property of Joseph Green in the southwest quarter of section 34, township three south, range four east, has been purchased by the company, and its representatives are acquiring a right of way for a road up the north bank of the river. Negotiations are so under way for the right of way for a motor line which will probably connect with the Mount Scott line at Leatis and tap the rich country running through Damascus, Eagle Creek, the Palmetto settlement and Springwater down to the power station. A well developed rumor is afloat that the line will circle around through the Molalla district and join the line of the Portland City & Oregon Railway, which is owned by Fred S. Morris, the main promoter of the Oregon General Electric Company. The distance from Leatis to Damascus is about six miles. After passing Deep Creek the road would run about seven miles north of the Clackamas and south of Deep Creek to Eagle Creek. It is estimated there is a fall of 86 feet in 200 yards on the Clackamas River where the power house is to be built.

A road through this territory is a possibility that is not denied by Mr. Morris. It would enhance the value of a farm lying near the route 100 per cent and would swell the population of the county 50 per cent in five years.

UPPER HATCHERY CLOSED.

Superintendent Crumbley Turned Out Over 93 1/2 Per Cent of the Catch.

Superintendent J. S. Crumbley, of the Upper Clackamas State Hatchery returned Friday with Theodore Huerth, of Parkplace, having finished the season's work. They left the station, which is thirty miles up the Clackamas from Oregon City, November 30, and were five days making the trip over a mountain trail. Mr. Crumbley reports that he has turned out 4,760,200 salmon fry. This is the biggest year the hatchery has ever had with one exception. There is a report current that Master Fish Warden VanDusen will recommend the removal of the hatchery to a site further down the river. Six miles below the station there is an excellent location for a hatchery and while much work would be necessary to make it equal to the present one, the expenditure of a small sum of money would establish a suitable station. The main difficulty in the location of the upper hatchery is the variation in the degree of water, which is brought from Trout Creek through a flame four thousand feet long with a fall of only one quarter of an inch per sixteen feet. While the water is abundant it runs very slowly and gets extremely warm and this causes the eggs to hatch too quickly. Superintendent Crumbley will probably not return to the hatchery until spring unless steel-heads are taken. If properly handled two million steelhead eggs could be hatched.

Mr. Crumbley took 5,104,000 eggs this season and the loss by dead eggs was 337,800. He hatched 4,766,200 eggs or over 93 1/2 per cent of the catch. The last batch of 272,000 was turned out December 1. The Upper Clackamas Hatchery has a sub-station on Huerth's place, where 397,000 eggs were eyed. On September 24 the sub-station was abandoned for the season. One hundred and seventeen thousand eggs were sent to the government hatchery on the Clackamas, and 95,000 were turned out on the bars. John Hatton, who was in charge of the sub-station, had previously sent 43,000 to Superintendent Carter, of the Government Station and these were placed in the miniature hatchery at the Portland Carnival. The Clackamas is the best stream in the state for salmon hatcheries and is the only one in Oregon and Washington where the spring run of Royal Chitlook salmon can be obtained.

LEAVE YOUR MONEY IN THE SAFE. Hold-ups are frequent and it is dangerous to go about at night.

The number of hold-ups in and about Oregon City during the past week has been alarming. It is dangerous to venture off Main street after nightfall and the robberies are becoming more and more frequent until people are beginning to consider ways and means to catch the thief, for the recent hold-ups are believed to have been committed by the same man. Night Officer Shaw and Dr. M. C. Strickland laid for the offender last night, but as luck would have it, he did not appear. A Willamette Falls Railway car was held up last week and Sunday morning three men were robbed on the west end of the bridge. Monday night Henry Meldrum, United States Surveyor General, was stopped by a train, while going to his home about eleven o'clock, and asked to hand over his money. The Surveyor General is a very determined man and though he had very little money in his purse, he had a watch that he values very highly. He remonstrated with the man in a very forcible manner and backed off into the glare of the electric light near a corner where two men were standing talking. The presence of the other men frightened the highwayman and he made no effort to press the matter. The same man stopped a boy Tuesday night and asked him if he had any money. The boy told him that he had none and was allowed to go unmolested.

An old Frenchman, named Collett, returned Wednesday from working in a woodcamp over in Washington and tells a story of being robbed there a few nights ago. He left Oregon City a few weeks ago with \$60 in gold in a belt around his waist and obtained employment through a Portland agency. While out in the timber alone he was robbed by two men who cut his belt to obtain the money and afterward knocked him senseless with a heavy club. Collett has his mutilated belt and two nasty scars on the temple to prove his story. His home is in Maple Lane.

Hon. Thomas A. McBride was in the city Sunday. He left in the evening for Astoria and held court there Monday. He returned to Hillsboro Wednesday. Judge McBride will open circuit court in this city December 19.
