Congressman Tongue has introduced a bill in the house appropriating \$60,000 for a public building in this city. The Oregonian's Washington correspondent says: "The bill introduced by Representative Tongue, appropriating \$60,000 for a public building at Oregon City, will join the great majority before the committee on public buildings and grounds, and should it meet with the approval of that committee, is likely to be made a part of an omnibus public building bill, which is almost sure to be reported later in the session. The bill provides for the erection of a building for the accommodation of the land office, postoffice and other government offices in Oregon City.
