Bacon Hogs For Home Meat Supply.

I like lean pork, and if necessary to have 500 lbs. for a family supply, I would rather kill three pigs than one to and effectually as too little. furnish it. I recently killed a pig, 18 months old, which dressed 240 lbs. It was not a profitable animal to market, but very nice for home use. The outside layer of fat on the carcass was not over one inch thick. Such a hog would have been considered a disgrace to the one who raised it in my New England neighborhood 25 years ago.

My practice in curing pork is to cut hams, shoulders and lowls a reasonable size, to sugar-cure and smoke, and hang up spareribs and loms in a cool place but there is no reason to believe that until needed to bake. > Select a large, fat, tender turkey and have it dressed, drawn, wiped dry and well singed. Rub it over, inside and out, with pepper and salt. Make a stuffing of the following ingredients; One pound light bread crambs, bulf a pound of botter, a beaping tablespoonful of minced onion, salt, pepper and sage, and enough water to mix rather soft. Stuff the breast first and sew it up, then stuff the body. Rub the turkey all over with melted butter, and dredge well with sifted flour. Lay it in the pan on its breast and pour in a quart of water, Have the oven well heated but not too hot as the turkey must cook slowly to be done. Allow a quarter of an hour for each pound. From time to time baste the turkey with the gravy in the pan and rub over with a larding mop dipped in melted butter. As it browns turn from side to side and last of all brown the breast. If, while cooking, the gravy in the pan boils away too much, more water should be added.

Moi-twe For the Potato

There is no farm crop that is more easily, speedily and greatly affected by the supply of moisture than is the potato. takes about 425 tons water to grow a ton of dry matter of potatoes. A crop of 200 bushels per acre would therefore require approximately 650 tons water; equivalent to a rainfall of nearly six inches. Because of its need for large water supply and its remarkable susceptibility to climatic conditions, it follows that the average potato yield is affected more by water supply than by lack of methods of culture must be with these the presence of large amounts of readily available plant food will prove of bulittle value if the moisture supply is deficient. It is also true that too much water will check the growth as quickly

Expansion of Eggs.

The business of producing eggs is one which could be expanded with great rapidity. Although the poultry business has been boomed on the Pacific roast for many years the imports of Eastern eggs keep right on year after year. Prices of eggs steadily average several cents per dozen higher here than in the middle West. It is evident, therefore, that the average farmer on this coast has not learned how to make the production of eggs profitable, or the home supply would grow much faster than has been
