GREEN ESTATE ADMINISTRATOR

Judge Denies Petition to Appoint H. E. Cross, and Names T. P. Randall.

Judge Ryan yesterday decided the case of the John Green estate by accepting the resignation of C. D. Latourette, who had been appointed administrator, but to whom objection had been made, and the motion to revoke his letters had been heard. The court also denied the petition for the appointment of H. E. Cross, which had also been filed and for the best interests of the estate appointed a disinterested person, County Recorder Tom P. Randall. The controversy was over a small piece of land about 18 miles up the Clackamas river. Joseph Green, the petitioner, and a brother to the deceased, first asked that H. E. Cross be appointed administrator of the estate, and afterwards sold the land to Dan J. Moore, representing the Clackamas Development Company, to whom the property is desirable. Green then turned around and sold the land to George Brown for \$1100. The last purchaser is an engineer of the Portland City & Oregon Railway Company and the Oregon General Electric Company and filed a petition asking for the appointment of Latourette as administrator. This petition was presented to the court first and was granted. The O. G. E. Co. want the land for their power plant and the Clackamas Development Company want to secure the property for logging purposes.
