CITIZENS AND DEMOCRATS.

Dates Are Set For the County Primaries and Convention.

The Citizens Committee of nine met Wednesday and issued an address to the voters of the county. April 5 was set as a date for the primaries and April 8 for the county convention, which will consist of 200 delegates, one at large from each precinct and one for every 16 votes cast at the last Presidential election. W. W. Jesse was elected chairman of the committee and O. W. Eastham secretary. A call was issued Wednesday for the Democratic primaries and county convention, the former to be held April 5 and the convention April 7. As the anti-fusion Democrats are in a minority, it is believed that the Democratic convention will elect delegates to the state, district, and congressional conventions, and adjourn. The convention must be held to maintain the party organization, but the fusionists are probably strong enough to vote down any proposition on the part of the middle-of-the-road Democrats to place a straight county ticket in the field.

After being quarantined for three weeks the family of Rev. E. S. Bollinger of the Congregational Church is again at liberty. The case of scarlet fever which caused the red flag to be displayed was one of the lightest form, consequently no other members of the family, excepting the little girl, were taken down with the disease. The origin of the contagion is a mystery.

Rev. E. S. Bollinger will conduct the services in the Congregational Church on the coming Sunday. The theme for the morning will be "Jesus Christ the Completion of Man." In the evening the series of "Plain Talks on Practical Subjects" will be continued, the particular topic being "What Does Your Religion Cost You?"

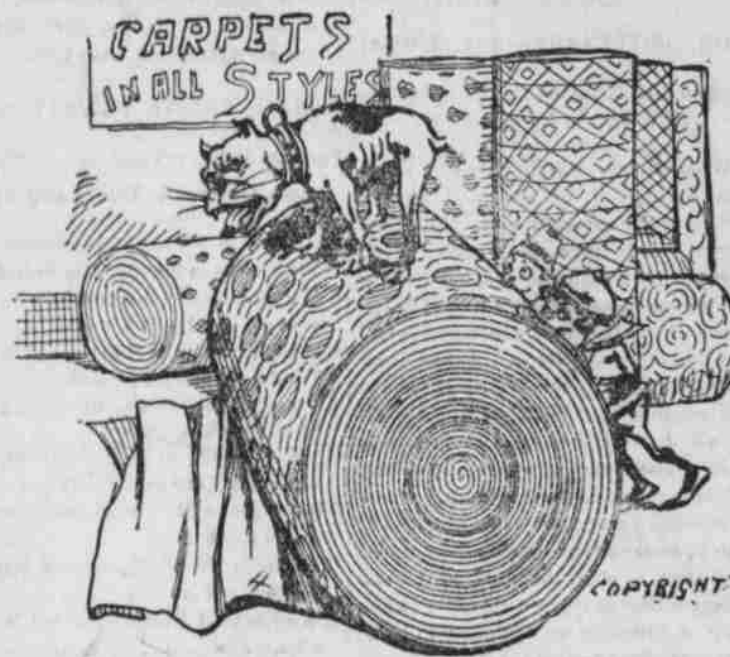
