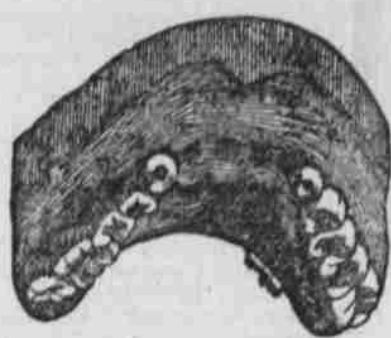


Figure 1 shows a mouth where the four incisors have been extracted, and the two cusps (eye teeth) destroyed to the gum line, showing the cuspid roots prepared to receive a bridge.

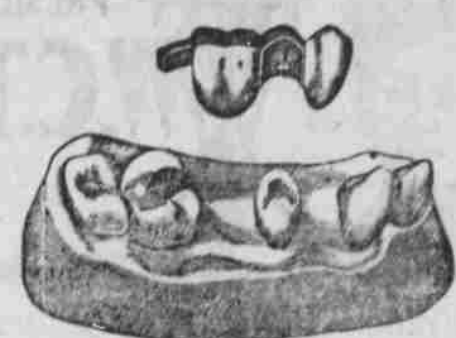


Figure 5 shows the loss of two upper teeth, the six year molar and the first bicupid. The bridge above is attached by an open base gold crown over the second incisor, and a bar which extends into a cavity of the adjoining molar.

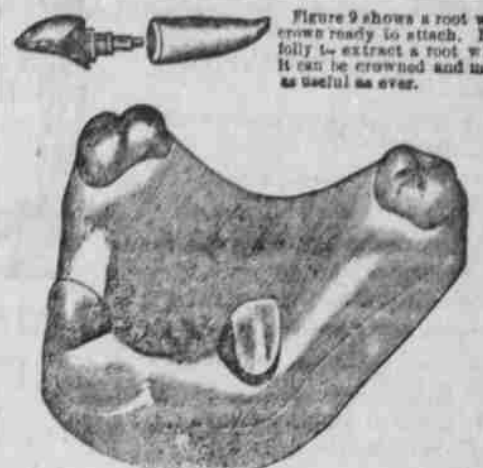


Figure 9 shows a root with crown ready to attach. It is fully extracted and made as useful as ever.

Figure 6 shows the bridge anchored in position.

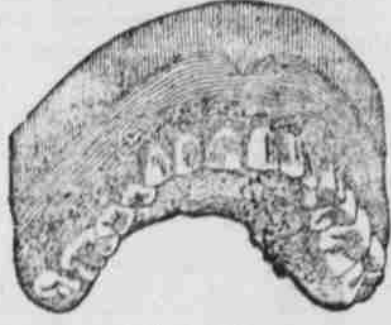


Figure 3 shows the case after the bridge has been fitted in position.

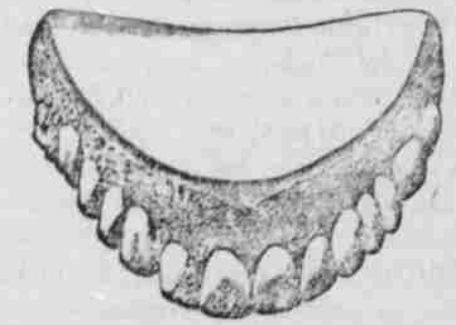


Figure 7 represents a full set of teeth on a gold plate.



Figure 4 shows a full set of teeth on a gold plate.

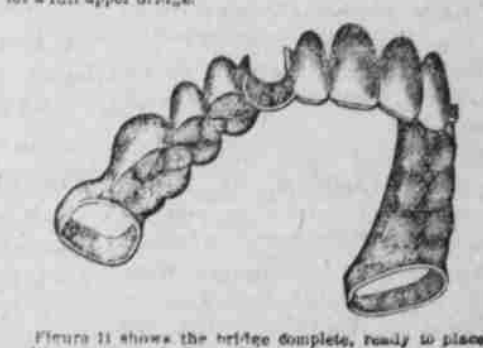


Figure 10 is a mouth that has lost all the teeth but four (two cusps and two molars); they are shown as prepared for a full upper bridge.

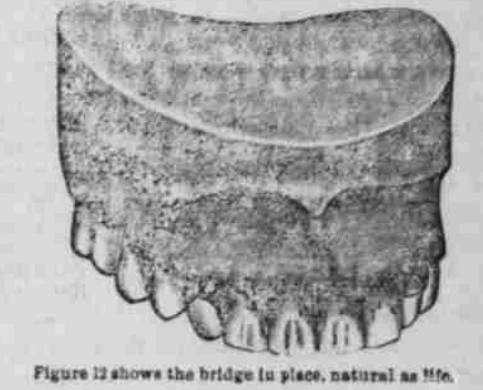


Figure 11 shows the bridge complete, ready to place in position. It shows a full set of teeth on a gold plate.

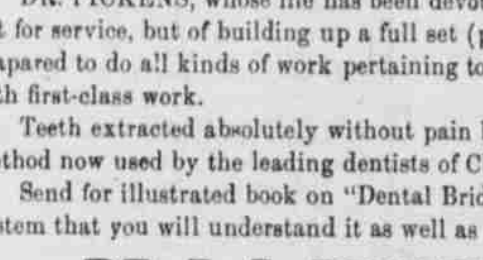


Figure 8 illustrates a case in which the lateral incisors have been lost and the central incisor crown destroyed. To this case a tooth has been fastened and the crown has been made off to the crown to fit the lateral space left by the lost lateral incisor.

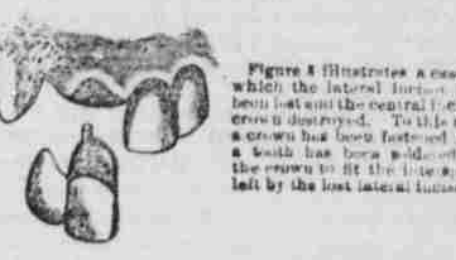


Figure 12 shows the bridge in place, natural as life.
