THE LOCAL NEWS.

BOATMAN'S CASTING.—Last Saturday water commission received a new plate for the running gear of the irrigation pump in the power station, was cast in one piece at the Portland Works, and weighs 3 1/2 tons.

REORDER BEYS A HOUSE.—Chy Redder Bruce C. Curry Tuesday purchased of J. M. Taylor the lot on which stands the house formerly occupied by Miles, of the firm of Metcalf and Miles. The house is just across the street from the Cochrane residence and Curry will move in without delay.

COVERING THE TANKS.—Councilman Pitt, with a force of men, is engaged in constructing a house to cover and enclose settling tanks of the new filter plant, which there are two, each with a capacity of 40,000 gallons. The building is constructed of wood, with a corrugated roof, and its dimensions are 30x52 feet. When completed it will prevent debris from being thrown into the tanks from the Southern Pacific railroad track, which is just above and in the rear of the tanks.

DR. BACHMAN JOINS THE NAVY.—News received in this city Wednesday of appointment of Dr. Robert A. Bachman to be assistant surgeon in the United States Navy. The dispatches state his residence as Pennsylvania. Dr. Bachman is well known in Oregon City and had charge of the practice of Dr. E. Sommer during the absence of the doctor in the east. He went to Alaska to fall as surgeon on a revenue cutter. His appointment is very pleasing news to his many friends here.

FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION.—The Merchants Association met last night and made preliminary arrangements for a Fourth of July celebration. The intention of the association to have the celebration a big success and a committee was appointed to invite all of the citizens to the next meeting of the celebration, which will be an open one. The lodges will be invited to cooperate. The matter of the purchase by the United States government of the famous River locks was discussed and the association agreed to lend all assistance possible to induce the government to buy the locks or to build a new system.

JUDGE CAPLEN'S LECTURE.—Judge John Caplen, of Portland, addressed a large audience in Willamette Hall last night on his travels in Chile. He spent four years as United States consul at Valparaiso. He entertained his hearers for an hour with his experiences. He related incidents of his trip from the time he left Portland and of his experiences in Chile. He described the peculiarities of the people and of the country. The program included several pleasing recitations by the Maccabee quartet and a solo by Charles A. Miller. Quite a large sum was realized for the benefit of the Clackamas County Humane Society under whose auspices the lecture was given, and the proceeds will be devoted toward the erection of a public drinking fountain.

MRS. SHIRLEY AT SHIVELY'S.—The street-goers of the city have been amused every night this week by the Mrs. Shirley Company at Shively's opera house. Crowded houses have attended the company every night. The company is a prime favorite here and puts up a very good production, far above the average of the usual run of the company that are shown here. Every night the company makes Oregon City for its run and some of the members,

who have been with the company for several years, have many friends in the city. Tonight "The Two Orphans" will be on the boards and the bill tomorrow night, which the last appearance of the company, will be "The Sultan's Daughter." A matinee will be given tomorrow afternoon, "The Wyoming Mail."

Y. M. C. A. NOTES.—The membership contest will close April 1, instead of March 20 as at first announced. At that time the ladies' auxiliary will serve supper and give a social entertainment as was promised. The "Reds" are at the present time in the lead as far as getting new members is concerned while the "Blues" have won all but one game in the gymnasium. While the contest lasts the entrance fee of one dollar will be remitted to all who join, but after April 1 it will be charged again and all must pay six dollars instead of five. The stereopticon lectures which were announced for each Tuesday evening of the present month were postponed last Tuesday on account of the revival meetings which are being held at the Methodist church but will be resumed again next Tuesday providing the meetings close before that time.

NOT QUITE INSANE.—Charles L. Gruell was brought before Judge Ryan and Dr. J. W. Norris last Saturday to be examined on the charge of insanity. The complaint was made by Commissioner Lewellen. The patient has been working in a woodcamp at Clackamas and about six weeks ago was taken ill and was sent to the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland. He was discharged March 8 and went home. He became ill again and Commissioner Lewellen was notified and went down to see the man, and brought him to this city. Dr. Norris and Judge Ryan discharged him after examination, with the opinion that he should be placed in charge of the county authorities. Gruell is a laborer, was born in New York 49 years ago and was once an inmate of an insane asylum. His sister was insane. The county will look after the man and see that he is taken care of.

DENIES THE RUMOR. Judge Ryan Says He Has Not Reduced Tax on Corporations.

Regarding the rumor which has been in circulation in several out-of-town precincts, concerning the stand of County Judge Ryan in reducing the tax valuations of property owned by corporations, the judge said yesterday: "One of the most idle and senseless rumors that have been circulated for the purpose of injuring my candidacy is that I am a friend of the corporations in the sense of reducing their valuations for taxation purposes. I have ever been, in office or out of office, an advocate of assessment of property at its full cash value, believing that it is the only manner in which an equitable adjustment of the expenses of government can be made. In proof of this it will be found that such was my manner of assessing property while acting as School Clerk under the old order, and also my refusal to reduce the assessment of large corporations while acting on the County Board of Equalization during my term of office as County Judge."

TROUBLE IN THE PIPER FAMILY.

Mr. Piper Says He Will Send His Wife to the Poor House.

Judge McBride has granted a temporary injunction restraining Herman Piper from interfering with or preventing Augusta Piper from using for road purposes a strip of land 20 feet wide along the South boundary of a 12 acre tract, deeded to her by Herman Piper about three years ago. This order is the outcome of a series of domestic troubles that have existed between the Pipers for several years. Nearly four years ago Augusta Piper sued Herman Piper for divorce on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. After the suit was filed Herman Piper induced his wife to return home and withdraw the suit, and as a compensation for his ill treatment of her, deeded to her 12 acres on the West Side of a 40 acre tract owned by Piper. The land is situated near Sunnyside, where the couple reside. He reserved a 20 foot strip along the south side of the 12 acre tract for a road. They resumed their life but Piper again commenced his cruel treatment of his wife and two years after the first application she again brought suit for a divorce, which was granted. Piper then fenced in the road so that his former wife could not reach the county road which abuts on the southwest corner of the 12 acre tract. Her attorneys have secured a citation from the Circuit Court commanding Piper to appear at the April term of Court and show cause why Mrs. Piper should not be permitted to use the road, and why an order should not be made compelling the defendant to pay her \$25 a month for the support of their children. Mrs. Piper says that Piper has openly boasted that he would reduce her to the poorhouse before he was through with her.
