believer that it is wise policy to build in the future: that no money be expended in the construction of roads outside of the road fund provided by law until the indebtedness of the county is decreased and fully paid. It is believed and demand that no extra help or deputies should be employed by any county officer, without a vote of the board of county commissioners, under oath setting forth the necessity of such employment and the amount of wages to be paid.

When the convention met at the evening session, E. U. Hackett nominated John W. Meldrum for county surveyor and he was unanimously declared the nominee.

Dr. C. S. Seemann was placed in nomination for coroner and the nomination was seconded by R. J. Schuebel. C. U. Barlow nominated Dr. C. A. Stuart, Mr. Bradley nominated R. L. Holman and Mr. Hackett seconded the nomination. Chas. Haines, of Oswego, and others also seconded the nomination. The first ballot resulted: Holman, 57; Seemann, 37; Stuart, 48. As there were 142 votes cast and 72 were necessary for a choice, a second ballot was ordered and resulted: Holman, 81; Seemann, 19; Stuart, 48. Mr. Holman was declared the nominee and thanked the convention.

Mr. Marvin, of Killin, nominated Samuel Irons, for representative. Mr. Johnson placed Hans Paulson in nomination. D. W. Kinnaird nominated Charles Toole, of Canemah. Mr. Jagger nominated O. I. Barbur, of Killin. Mr. C. Hooper nominated C. K. Ballard, of Milwaukie. R. Koerner nominated C. H. Dye. John H. Gibson, of Milwaukie, was nominated. J. H. Revenue nominated Silas Hedges, of Cherryville. Mr. Inskeep nominated C. C. Smith, of Eagle Creek. J. U. Campbell nominated C. G. Huntley, of Oregon City. G. B. Dimick nominated Herman A. Webster, of Clackamas. O. H. Wright, of Mackburg, nominated A. M. Vinyard, of Canby. The first ballot resulted: Irons, 11; Paulsen, 99; Toole, 4; Barbur, 7; Ballard, 17; Dye, 39; Gibson, 8; Hedges, 56; Smith, 17; Huntley, 106; Webster, 78; Vinyard, 1. Messrs. Huntley, Paulsen and Webster were declared the nominees of the convention, and the nominations were made unanimous.

The delegates to the state convention were instructed to use all honorable means to secure the nomination of County Surveyor E. P. Rands for joint senator and Hon. Charles H. Dye for joint representative.

The following delegates were elected to the congressional convention: D. W. Kinnaird, Geo. Garfield, Tom P. Randall, J. F. Robinson, Fred Wagner, J. W. Moffatt, E. H. Burghardt, E. L. Johnson, T. F. Ryan, T. B. Killen, J. R. Cole, S. S. Walker, R. Scott, F. C. Brown, A. D. Hill, Jacob Miley.

A resolution instructing the delegates to the state convention to vote for the nomination of T. T. Geer was referred to the committee on resolutions and platform, but with defeat staring it in the face, was withdrawn. Two tickets were placed in nomination for delegates to the state convention. One ticket, headed by Dr. C. B. Smith, of Eagle Creek, was overwhelmingly beaten by the regular or Porter ticket. Dr. Smith was the prime mover of the Geer forces, which were in a hopeless minority.

The following delegates were elected to the state convention: T. A. McBride, W. A. Garner, Geo. C. Brownell, A. Mather, L. L. Porter, W. W. Smith, J. U. Campbell.

No candidate having received a majority another ballot was ordered, with the following result: Blair, 26; Nelson 61; Dauchy 11; Harrington, 45. Messrs. Dauchy and Blair withdrew. The ballot resulted: Nelson, 80; Harrington, 56. Upon motion of Mr. Harrington, Nelson's nomination was made unanimous. Mr. Nelson thanked the convention and said he would do his best to cut down the expenses of the office.

For commissioner Allen Cooke nominated J. R. Morton. J. H. Revenue, of Eagle Creek, seconded the nomination. Charles Haines nominated William Brobst. The vote resulted: Brobst, 84; Morton 61. Upon motion the nomination was made unanimous.

The convention adjourned until 7 P. M. When the convention met at the evening session, E. U. Hackett nominated John W. Meldrum for county surveyor and he was unanimously declared the nominee.




Figure 1 shows a mouth where the four incisors have been extracted, and the two cusps (eye teeth) are shown ready to receive a bridge.



Figure 2 represents the bridge ready for adjustment.




Figure 3 represents the case after the bridge has been placed in position.

Figure 4—It is useless to wear a plate in the mouth when a bridge can be attached to a few remaining teeth and roots.




Figure 5 shows the loss of two upper teeth, the six year molar and the first bicuspid. The bridge above is attached by an open face crown over the second bicuspid, and a bar which extends into a cavity of the adjoining molar.



Figure 6 shows the bridge anchored in position.




Figure 7 represents a full set of teeth on a gold plate.




Figure 8 illustrates a case in which the lateral incisor has been lost and the central incisor crown destroyed. To this root a crown has been soldered and a tooth has been soldered to the crown to fill the interspace left by the lost lateral incisor.



Figure 9 shows a root with crown ready to attach. It is fully to extract a root when it can be crowned and made as useful as ever.




Figure 10 is a mouth that has lost all the teeth but four, the two cusps and two molars; they are shown as prepared for a full upper bridge.




Figure 11 shows the bridge complete, ready to place in position, as shown in figure 10.

Figure 12 shows the bridge in place, natural as life.

AROUND THE COURT HOUSE

A station license has been issued to W. F. Young, of Sherwood.

The final report of E. W. and Frank S. Hutchins, administrators of the estate of Thomas A. Hutchins, deceased, has been approved. The administrators have been discharged and their bondsmen exonerated.

A petition was filed in the county clerk's office Monday asking for the appointment of W. M. Shank as administrator of the estate of J. Earl Faulkner, who was killed Thursday by falling on a shaft at the Willamette Paper Mills. The petition cites that Faulkner left an estate valued at \$500, consisting of monies, personal effects and claims due the deceased. There are two claims against the estate: R. P. Hall for board, \$15; Shank & Bissel, expenses incurred in embalming and shipping body and cost of metallic casket, \$370.50. The dead man left two heirs: J. E. Faulkner, a brother and Mrs. Nancy Hypes, a sister, of Bluefield, West Virginia.

Joseph Ellis.

The body of Joseph Ellis, who died last Saturday of broncho-pneumonia at Wardner, Idaho, arrived here Monday morning, and was interred in Beaver Creek cemetery, by the side of his wife, who died suddenly about one year ago. The funeral services were held in the Graceme Church, Rev. E. S. Bollinger officiating. Deceased was formerly a resident of New Era and was a mining man. He went to Idaho two years ago. His age was 58 years.

Mrs. Christina Gillmore.

Mrs. Christina Gillmore died at 11 o'clock last Sunday morning at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. George Hoeye, aged 77 years.

She was born near Cleveland, O., May 17, 1826, and crossed the plains with her husband, John Gillmore, in 1854, locating near Harrisburg, Linn County, where they spent their first winter. Later they moved to Marion County, and took up a donation land claim near Salem. They spent about ten years on this farm and then moved to Salem where her husband died in 1886, aged 71 years, leaving her with the following children: William R. Gillmore (now deceased), of Salem; Mrs. Robert F. Hughes, Mrs. George Hoeye, Charles H. Gillmore, and James Riley Gillmore, of Oregon City. Mrs. Gillmore moved from Salem to this city four years ago, and has since resided with her daughter, Mrs. George Hoeye. The body was taken to Salem Monday

morning on the 9:22 train and the funeral was held there at 11 A. M.
