SMALLPOX SCARE.

Disease Exists in Several Families and Prompt Measures Have Been Taken.

Rumors of the existence of several cases of smallpox at Gladstone have been circulated about the city for several days and yesterday morning the board of county commissioners sent County Physician C. A. Stuart and Dr. W. E. Carl to Gladstone to ascertain the truth of the report. They returned yesterday afternoon and stated that they found five cases in the family of Harvey E. Cross, a prominent lawyer of this city who resides at Gladstone. Mr. Cross and four of his children are just convalescing from a mild attack of varioloid. Captain J. T. Apperson and Judge William Galloway reported that Mr. Cross had attended church last Sunday and had told Captain Apperson that he believed that he was coming down with smallpox. The family was ordered to remain in close quarantine for several days. At Clackamas Heights there are three cases in the family of Alex Brown, all children. All of the cases are of a mild form. It is believed by the physicians that half of the people in the city have been exposed. One day last week a woman came from Portland and visited a family in Kansas City Addition. She traded at several stores in town and returned to Portland, when it was discovered that she had a fully developed case of smallpox and she was sent to the pest house. The Board of Directors of the Oregon City public schools have made an order that all children attending schools must be vaccinated before Monday or show a certificate from a physician that vaccination is not necessary. The authorities are taking active measures against the possible spread of the disease.

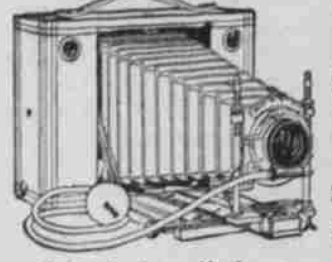
