EDUCATORS MET LAST SATURDAY

County Teachers' Association at the Eastham School.

FOUR PAPERS WERE PRESENTED

Over Seventy Teachers Attended the Institute and Listened to Many Valuable Suggestions.

The regular meeting of the Clackamas County Teachers' Association was held at the Eastham School last Saturday. The association was called to order at 11 A. M. by Supt. Zinser. The program was opened by singing "America."

"How to teach Civil Government" was the subject assigned to Miss Porter. Miss Porter believed that if a teacher does not like a certain text-book, she should be careful to leave the child in ignorance of her dislike, as children naturally lose faith in a text book under those conditions.

The subject was discussed by Prof. Wilcox, Supt Zinser and Prof. Gary. Miss Sade Chase spoke on "Mathematical Geography." She said: "When pupils reach the proper age to study mathematical geography they are old enough to understand the story of the nebular hypothesis."

Dinner was announced and the association adjourned to the first floor, where an elaborate luncheon was served. The tables were decorated with bouquets of narcissus and violets and potted ferns.

The afternoon program began by singing "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean."

"Nature Study in the Elementary Schools" was the subject assigned to Miss Alice Quigg, of Portland Academy. She said: "The man or woman of today lacks culture who has no sense of the beautiful in nature, in whom the esthetic part of mind is not developed."

Miss Smith, of the Eastham school, spoke on the same subject. Prof. Zinser make an excellent talk on this subject. He emphasized the idea of teaching subjects when they are naturally most interesting. Teach of flowers and birds in the springtime, when the birds come from the south and flowers begin to bloom, and the interest of children is already aroused on both subjects.

Miss Mary Conyers sang "Rosary" and responded to an enthusiastic encore. Prof. R. C. French, of the State Normal School, spoke on "The Importance of Educational Thought, Past and Present." He said: "Upon the teacher rests much of the responsibility for weakness and instability of character, which may be traced to faulty foundations."

This paper was exceedingly fine. The subject was presented in an able manner, and the ideas presented were practical and helpful. Prof. Zinser made an excellent talk on this subject. "When the teacher feels an atmosphere of indifference, he will generally find himself somewhat to blame for it." He urged the keeping of Arbor Day in a fitting manner.

Mrs. M. Douthitt offered several suggestions.

Ex-Supt. Rowland was called upon to speak for the good of the association and responded. Mr. Gary also spoke in the same good cause.

A resolution of thanks to the good people of Oregon City for their kindness and hospitality to the association, and also to Miss Quigg, of Portland, and Prof. French, of Monmouth, for their excellent addresses, was unanimously passed.
