All that is new about the proposed Initiative and Referendum in Oregon is the extension of the direct power of the people over practically all state and local laws. The principal is old, even in this State, in purery local matters, except that it has been always necessary to get a special act or the consent of the legislature. Since 1885, one bundred voters by their Initiative petition filed with the

county clerk, have been able to compel a vote in their county on the question of swine running at large. See section 3416 Oregon Code. In 1893 this law was amended to make the Initiative petition apply to stock of all kinds. Session Laws 1893, p. 89. Upon the Initiative petition of twenty-

five taxpayers, the question of accepting the public park law of 1800 must be sub-mitted to the citizens in cries of not less than three thousand inhabitants. Laws 1809, sec. I page 68. The question of a special tax levy for park purposes must se decided by Referendum vote. Laws 899, sec. 6, page 70. 1899, sec. 6, page 70.

The Irrigation law of 1895, Session Laws, page 13, is another example of local lawmaking by the people through their own Initiative petition and voice, in the matter of creating and governing irrigation districts.

There are other examples in our laws, but they are all local, and under powers conferred by the legislature.
