SERVICES AT REDLAND.—In future will be preaching at the Bethel Christian Church at Redland every day at three o'clock by Rev. Julian H. pastor. Sabbath School as usual at 10 o'clock.

CONTRACTS.—The following hop contracts were recorded in County Recorder Randall's office Saturday: J. P. met to Falk, Wormser & Co., of Oswego, 7000 pounds from the yard one northwest of Battleville at 11½¢ per pound. J. N. and M. A. met to Lilienthal Bros., of Newburg, 7000 pounds from the eight acre tract near east of Woodburn, at 10¢ per pound.

JOINT REPRESENTATIVE.—The Democratic County Central Committee met today and nominated W. F. Young, of East Hill, for Joint Representative Multnomah and Clackamas counties. The nominee is a school teacher and a candidate for commissioner at the Citizens' County Convention, which was taught school for the past six years and is the present Justice of the Peace for his precinct.

TRUST BILLS RETURNED.—Two true bills returned by District Attorney Harlow Allen in the Circuit Court Tuesday. One against Abraham Radeliffe and the other against Albert R. Fryrear, who assaulted a young girl, Ida L. Smith at Newburg about one month ago. He was given \$300 cash bail and skipped to Oregon where he now resides. A warrant was issued and the man apprehended if he ever steps into the county.

SCOTT FOR JOINT SENATOR.—Hon. Scott of Milwaukee, has been nominated for Joint Senator for Clackamas and Multnomah counties on the Republican ticket. The Republicans were so generous as to give to Clackamas County the Joint Senatorship. The nomination gave both the Joint Senator and Representative to Clackamas County. The Republicans gave both to Multnomah. In the nomination Mr. Scott the citizens have found the best and strongest men in the county.

WILSONVILLE REPUBLICAN CLUB.—Charles Baker was in the city Monday, assisting in the formation of a Republican Club at Wilsonville and secured aid of Senator Brownell, Mayor Dimick and other prominent Republicans. The club will be organized next Monday and it is expected that over 50 citizens will sign the roll of the club at its first meeting. Mr. Brownell, Mr. Dimick and other speakers will attend the meeting. This is only the first of a series of Republican Clubs that are being organized in the different precincts.

LICENSES ARE BEING PAID.—Deputy Fish Warden Henry E. Baltman was in the city Tuesday collecting fees from the fishermen on the Willamette and Clackamas Rivers, a number of whom have not yet paid. He will make all violations to the full extent of the law. Mr. Baltman will collect from the two fish dealers in Oregon City. Twenty-one individual fishermen have already taken out licenses, and fish warden has issued 22 net licenses and gill net licenses. Mr. Baltman expects that in the latter part of the season the salmon run will surpass that of last year.

BROWNELL ON THE STUMP.—State Senator George C. Brownell addressed a large crowd at Multnomah Saturday night on the campaign. He was enthusiastically received and his remarks received close attention. Mulino is the opponent of James F. Nelson, who is the Republican candidate for County Assessor,

and is strongly Republican. A number of candidates on the Citizens' ticket went to Oswego tonight and held a political meeting. Several speeches were made and a large audience was present. Tomorrow night Senator Brownell will go to Damascus and make an address there at 7:30 P. M. He will be accompanied by several prominent Republicans from this city. The people of Damascus are invited to attend the meeting.

TROUT FOR EASTERN OREGON.—Messenger H. Leighton Kelly, of the Clackamas United States Fish Commission Station, left Wednesday night with 45,000 Eastern brook trout for Eastern Oregon. Ten thousand of these will be left at The Dalles and the balance will be distributed in streams in the vicinity of Pendleton and the North Fork section house. The distribution will be conducted by the Oregon Fish and Game Association to whom the fish have been allotted by the United States Fish Commission. At The Dalles L. S. Fritz, a member of the association, will superintend the planting. Messenger Kelly will be accompanied from Pendleton by D. B. Watson and T. B. Four round trips will be made daily and the boat will touch at the following way landings and at no other points: Magone's Park, Meldrum's, Morey's, Risley's and Oswego. The following schedule will be maintained: Leave Oregon City at 7 and 10 A. M. and at 1:30 and 4 P. M. Leave Portland at 8:30 and 11:30 A. M. and at 3:00 and 6:15 P. M. The steamer will lay over nights at Oregon City. Round trip 25 cents.

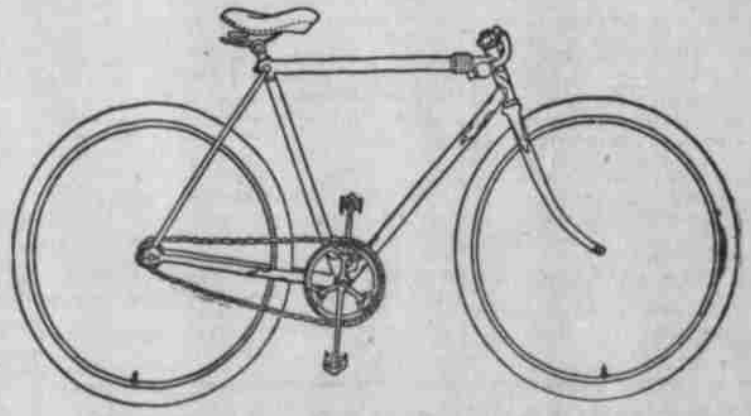
