Relative to the statement which is being circulated through the county by the "reformers," Mr. Brownell said yesterday: "It is being circulated that I supported a bill in the senate to repeal what is known as the Road Supervisor law. There was such a bill introduced and in order to save my law from being repealed I voted for it in the Senate. This bill then went to the House as we knew it would and as we intended it should, and got lost there; then what is known as 'House Bill No. 76,' which permits the people to elect road supervisors, instead of having the County Court appoint them, came up in the Senate. It was called up by Senator Porter of Clackamas County, and I voted for it upon its first reading, and second reading, and upon its final passing as every voter can see by examining Senate Journal, Session of 1901 at Pages 288 and 289."

The 10 office at Milwaukee was robbed Wednesday night of \$120. The office is in O. W. Wisinger's store, which was closed at 8:30 Wednesday night and was not opened until 6:30 yesterday morning; the robbery was discovered. The burglars had cut the upper portion of a pane of glass from a window and unfastened the catch, opening the window and climbing into the warehouse, from which a door was open leading into the store. Drawers containing the government funds were broken open with a hatchet and robbed, a revolver was stolen, and the cash register was rifled of a few dollars. A lot of cigars were also taken.
