CONFERENCE AT CANBY.—The annual conference of the Evangelical Association of Washington and Oregon convened at Canby yesterday morning, and will remain in session over Sunday.

CANBY AND BARLOW R. BERRIES.—On Friday night the Crescent saloon at Canby, owned by Herman Vorpahl, was robbed and robbed. The general store at Barlow was entered the same night.

It is supposed that he went to sleep while sitting near the shaft and tumbled over. His parents live at Needy, Clackamas county.

OFFICIAL BALLOT COMPLETED.—County Clerk Cooper has completed the preparation of the official ballot and it will be placed in the hands of the printer in a few days. There are four complete ballots in Clackamas County this year. The ballot for Oregon City will contain nearly 90 names. In one precinct, England, there are four nominations for road supervisors.

CRASHED TO DEATH.—A shocking accident happened here Monday evening when the little daughter of Neis Oats was burned to death. It appears as though the little girl, who was not more than seven years old, attempted to start a fire, the mother being absent, and in the manner her clothing ignited. She was pulled out of doors with her body enveloped in flames, and in a short time she died from the effects.

TO HELP THE REFERENDUM.—Secretary W. S. U'Ren, of the Direct Legislation League, of Oregon, has received contributions of five dollars to be applied to the work of educating the voter to support the initiative and referendum amendment from Eagle Creek Grange and Mayville, William County, Orange, Oregon of Husbandry and the Growth Union Society, of Portland.

INCREASED REGISTRATION.—The total registration in Clackamas county has exceeded expectations that it has passed the 4000 mark. This is caused by the large number of affidavits coming from country precincts. Over 100 affidavits were filed on Wednesday and while the registration will undoubtedly reach 4000. Two years ago the total registration was about 4300.

DAILY BOAT TO PORTLAND.—The resumption of the Oregon City-Portland line has commenced and the public will be pleased to learn that this city will enjoy a daily boat service all through the summer. The steamer Leona has been repaired and refitted and looks like a new boat. Four round trips will be made daily and the boat will touch at the following way landings and at no other points: Magone's Park, Meldrum's, Steyer's, Risley's and Oswego. The following schedule will be maintained: Leave Oregon City at 7 and 10 A. M. and at 1:30 and 4 P. M. Leave Portland at 8:30 and 11:30 A. M. and at 3:00 and 6:30 P. M. The steamer will lay over nights at Oregon City. Round trip 25 cents.

ADDITION TO PARKPLACE SCHOOL.—The Parkplace school district will shortly commence the construction of an addition to the school building, and the capacity of the building will be practically doubled. An addition 34x48 feet will be added and to this will be added an L, 23x4 feet. Two recitation rooms will be added on the lower floor and the upper part of the addition will be used for assembly rooms until required for study and recitation rooms. In the L will be placed the library and library. The district recently voted \$1000 to defray the expense of constructing the addition but this amount will not cover the cost. Building is very near in and about Oregon City at present and many new houses are in the course of construction. Dr. C. A. Stuart will soon put up a new residence on the tract on Fourth street.

GOLD MEDAL FOR TEASELS

Exhibit of the Late A. J. Sawtell Successful at Charleston.

One of the 14 gold medals secured by the Oregon agricultural exhibit at the Charleston Exposition on May 15, as reported by Commissioner Beach, was awarded to A. J. Sawtell, of Molalla, Clackamas County, for his display of teasels. Since this announcement was made the Oregonian has received quite a number of inquiries in regard to teasels, which show that many people do not have any idea what teasels are or what they are used for. This, however, is not much to be wondered at, says the Oregonian, as teasels are grown in only one section on the Pacific Coast, on the Molalla, and in only one section at the East, at Skaneateles, N. Y.

The teasel plant belongs to the thistle family, and so far as known is the only member of the family that is of any use to man. It is a biennial plant—that is, it requires two years to mature. The first year it produces leaves only; in the second year it throws out branches sur-

with which he had probably been familiar in the old country. For 23 years he was the only grower of teasels west of the Mississippi River, and in these years accumulated a competency. He invented a cylinder saw, or a cylinder, one end of which was toothed like a saw, which, when the stem of a teasel was run into it as it was revolving cut off the "bracts" and leaves at the base of the burr, a tedious operation when performed by hand. He had a Chinaman named "Mon" in his employ packing teasels for 14 years, when he accumulated a "fortune" and probably went back to China. Mr. Sawtell sold his farm about two years ago and was making arrangements to go on a visit to England when he was taken sick and died some time last Fall, so he had not the gratification of knowing that his display of teasels at Charleston won a gold medal.

One of his brothers is growing teasels in the same section where he cultivated them so long, and two brothers named Gregory, who came from Skaneateles, N. Y., a few years ago, are also in the same business there. In an article on teasels published in 1901, the Rural New Yorker said: "The

mounted by thistlelike heads, or burrs on long stems which, when ripe, are the parts of the plant utilized. They are covered by flowers, and afterward by seed vessels, each of which ends in a sharp, strong, springy hook. The dried burrs are used in woolen mills to raise the nap on cloth, being split in two lengthways and fastened to the surface of cylinders, which revolve rapidly, and when the cloth is passed over them the tiny hooks "tear" or tear the surface, raising a nap, as is seen on blankets, cotton flannel and many kinds of cloth. Teasels are used in nearly all woolen mills, and the plants are often seen growing in the vicinity of such mills. A substitute for the teasel has been made of steel, but it is used on coarse goods only.

A. J. Sawtell, to whom the gold medal mentioned was awarded, was an Englishman who settled on a farm on Rock Creek, Clackamas County, four miles south of Molalla town, about 30 years ago and engaged in the raising of teasels.
