The attention of the old soldiers and of the general public of Clackamas County is respectfully invited to the following proposal found in the following document which was filed with the chairmen of both the Republican and Citizens County Committees a few days ago.

Hicks, of the 1st Reg. of Oregon, U. V. U., or Battlemen of the Rebellion.

"At a regular meeting held on May 15, 1902, it was unanimously voted that we call on all the officers nominated by the different parties for aid in our maintaining the widows and orphans of our command, as we are without money and we number over one hundred members, of old veterans and need aid, and our motto is 'To help them who help us'."

Briefly stated, this organization styling itself the "Battlemen of the Rebellion" proposes to deliver the votes of over 100 old soldiers to the political party which will contribute the largest sum of money to the treasury of the said organization.

The committees were further advised that at the bids must be in on or before Saturday, the 24th inst. It is presumed that the right to reject any or all bids is reserved.

"We are assured by a member of the 'Regiment' (who is not in sympathy with the above proposition) that it was 'unanimously voted' at a large and enthusiastic meeting of six members.

It is difficult to find words to characterize such a proposal.

In behalf of the comrades of this county the writer desires most emphatically to protest against such an insult to the old soldiers. We are not in the market; our votes are not for sale at any price, and we are not to be corralled and delivered in lots to suit purchasers by any organization, "Battlemen" or others.

In the days of our youth, at the call of our country we went to battle for her deliverance and we have a right to be proud of it, but now, in our declining years, honor and duty are still dear to us, and we will steadfastly refuse to be considered as merchandise to be hawked about the political markets by a beggarly handful of self styled "Battlemen"—old soldiers by trade.

While we may differ in our political opinions, we are assured that there is no difference of opinion as to the infamous proposal made to the committees.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

The Republican Party in County Convention assembled, in Oregon City, Clackamas County, Oregon, March 26, 1902, congratulate the people of this county upon the general prosperous condition of our common country, as well as that of our own immediate vicinity.

We deeply deplore the untimely death of our well beloved President McKinley, whose memory is endeared to the hearts of all citizens. We hereby endorse the wise statesmanship of his successor, President Roosevelt, in his efforts to carry out the policies so ably begun by President McKinley.

We endorse and commend the action of President Roosevelt in his efforts to control the trusts, and to secure to labor an adequate recognition in its disputes with the capitalistic classes, and we hereby endorse his of our cordial sympathy and support.

We endorse and commend the action of our national representatives in championing the Nicaragua Canal Bill, the Mitchell-Kahn China Exclusion Bill, and the bill to pension Indian war veterans, and for the speedy passage of all these measures.

We demand a constitutional amendment for the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people.

Believing, as we do, that all people should participate as far as possible in the making of the laws by which they are governed, we hereby endorse and commend to the careful consideration of all the people the constitutional amendment known as the initiative and referendum, and urge upon all speakers and campaign workers to bring the same prominently before the voters.

We endorse the action of the last legislature in supporting Hon. J. H. Mitchell for the United States Senate.

We commend the action of Senators Brownell and Porter and Representatives Kruse, Talbert and Dresser for their support of what is known as the precinct assessor law, and the passage of the thirty days extension law for the wage earners of the State of Oregon, and their action in refusing to raise county salaries.

We instruct the nominees of this convention to both branches of the legislature, that if elected, they will make an earnest effort to pass legislation which will cause control of the school textbooks by the people of Oregon and their sale to the people at actual cost.

To obtain legislation by which a portion of the State revenues may be raised by a graduated income tax and a graduated inheritance tax.

To obtain legislation reducing the passenger fare in the State of Oregon to three cents per mile.

To obtain legislation constituting eight hours a days' work throughout the State.

To labor for a Precinct Assessor Law.

In regard to County affairs: we hereby pledge the nominees of this convention, that if elected they will insist upon an economical administration of county affairs, in such manner as to cut down expenses wherever possible.

We believe that it is wise policy to pursue in the future, that no money be expended in the construction of roads and bridges outside the road fund provided by the law until the indebtedness of the county decreased and fully paid.

We believe and demand that no extra clerical help or deputies should be employed by any county officer, without a petition under oath setting forth the facts, such as the time such clerk or deputy is to be employed, for what purpose, the necessity of such employment and the amount of wages to be paid.
