WHEAT ON FLOUR.—The Portland Mills closed down last Friday morning after an eight days' run which averaged May 15. In that time 4700 bushels of flour were turned out. Although there is considerable wheat in the valley it is in the hands of men who are able to hold it and it is a very scarce commodity in the market. The mill may be short runs every few weeks but will resume permanent operations after harvest.

The steamer will lay over nights at Oregon City. Round trip 25 cents.

his home at Meldrum Place. He was severely bruised on the back and head, but his injuries are receiving careful attention and will not result seriously.

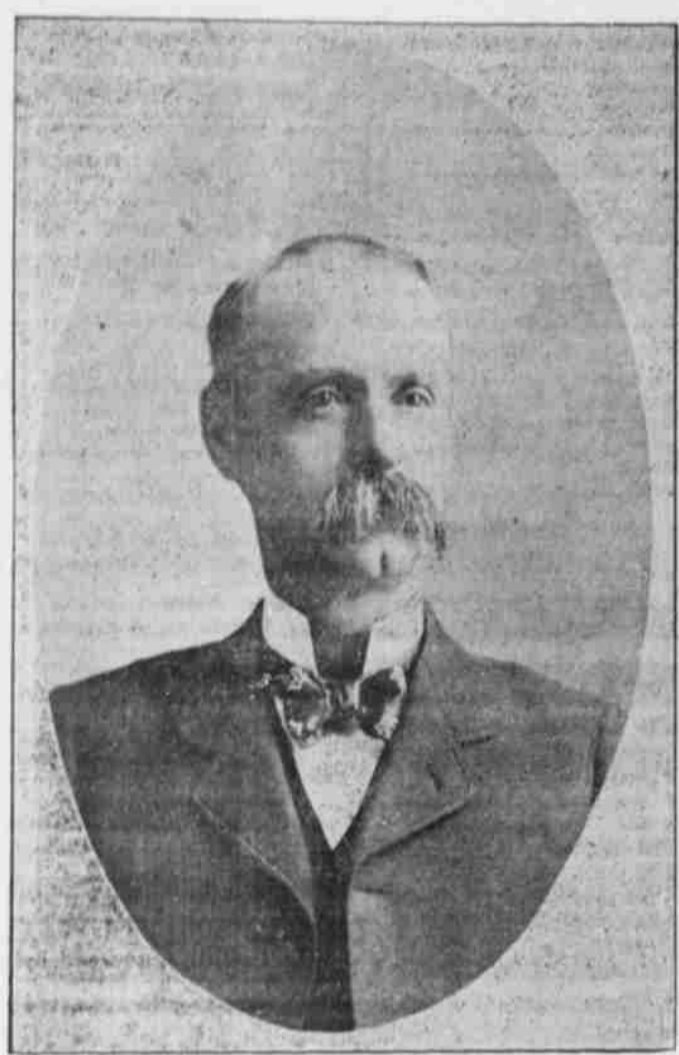
SCHUBEL AND DYE.
