Four round trips will be made daily and the boat will touch at the following way landings and at no other points: Magone's Park, Melidrum's, Wiley's, Risley's and Oswego. The following schedule will be maintained: Leave Oregon City at 7 and 10 A. M., and at 1:30 and 4 P. M. Leave Portland at 8:30 and 11:30 A. M. and at 3:00 and 6:30 P. M. The steamer will lay over nights at Oregon City. Round trip 25 cents.

REGULAR TRIPS ALL SUMMER.—Capt. Graham, president of the Oregon City Transportation Co., was in the city this week and while here informed us that his company had nearly come to an agreement on a new passenger rate, which would be a great reduction from the present fare. He also informed us that Independence would be favored with a boat service the entire year, the new boat the Oregon City Transportation Co. is building being of such light draught as to permit it to make regular trips all summer.—Independence Enterprise.

EVIDENCE WAS INSUFFICIENT.—Robert Gardner has been discharged from custody after a trial for robbery. He was defended by Attorney Grant B. Dimick, who was appointed by the Court. The evidence was not sufficient to convict. Gardner was indicted for stealing \$3.60 from Captain Jack Miller at Damascus last February. He is continually in some kind of trouble in the courts and at the time of his arrest was under sentence from the recorder's court in Oregon City for some petty crime. The sentence had been suspended upon condition that he would leave the city for one year. Gardner was given a severe reprimand by the court and disappeared from town immediately after his release.

WOODMEN MONUMENTS UNVEILED.—Monuments of Maurice Broderick and D. E. Shepard were unveiled in Mountain View cemetery Sunday afternoon by Willamette Falls Camp, Woodmen of the World. Memorial services for the dead neighbors were held in Woodmen Hall and the members of the camp, headed by the Woodmen Band, marched to the cemetery, where the unveiling ceremonies were held. The graves were profusely decorated with beautiful flowers. Addresses were made by Senator George C. Brownell and Rev. P. K. Hammond and Judge Ryan read the lodge poem. The Woodmen Band presented a neat appearance in white duck coats and caps.

DAMAGE SUIT COMPROMISED.—The damage suit of James Ware against Clackamas County was settled Saturday afternoon and dismissed, the plaintiff compromising for \$325. On July 11, 1896, Ware was driving a stage to Willhoit Springs and by reason of the bad condition of the road the vehicle was overturned, throwing Ware out and breaking his leg. Several of the passengers were also injured and a number of damage suits were brought against the county in consequence of the accident but were beaten. Ware asked for damages in the county court and failing in this brought suit, through attorneys U'Ren & Schubele, for \$3675. He secured a change of venue to Washington County, but, as a result of the compromise made Saturday, the case will not come to trial.

SUICIDE OF INEZ RIGGS.—The body of Inez Riggs was found in the Willamette River at Portland on Thursday of last week. A coroner's jury rendered a verdict of probable suicide. It was evident from the testimony that she was despondent over the loss of her lover. She was born in Needy, Clackamas County, in January, 1877. She was educated in the public school at Oregon City, at which place she lived for 12 years, residing part of this time with her sister, Mrs. E. Moore. Her residence in Portland covered a period of four years. Miss Riggs had a wide circle of friends, with whom she was very popular. She was very industrious, and besides supporting herself, purchased with her own earnings a piano and various other things to make her home attractive. Mrs. Riggs is distracted with grief at the loss of her daughter, and still thinks that she fell in the river accidentally, as she appeared to be in good spirits when she left home.

BROTHERS MEET AFTER 32 YEARS.—Two brothers, John D. Davis, of Oklahoma, and J. J. Davis, of Garfield, met last Saturday for the first time in 32 years. Early Saturday morning J. J. Davis, who is a well known farmer of Clackamas County and who resides about 30 miles from this city, came into

Wilson and Cooke's store, and after making some purchases, left the store. A few minutes afterwards a man came into the store and engaged Mr. Wilson in conversation, stating he was a brother to J. J. Davis and inquiring the way to his brother's home. "Your brother has just left the store," said Mr. Wilson, and hurrying out with Mr. Davis, found the brother. The two men did not recognize each other. The Oklahoma Davis is much older than the Clackamas County man and an absence of 32 years from each other had changed them both. The brothers left Saturday for Garfield, and John D. Davis will visit his brother and other relatives in the county during the next two months. His ambition is to ascend Mount Hood before his departure.

VACATION OF CAMBRIDGE.—The Board of County Commissioners just before adjournment last Monday granted the vacation of streets and lots in Cambridge to the Waverly Association. The objections of Mrs. Dr. Charlton were withdrawn and the objections of David Nelson were left pending. Last March the Waverly Association, which owns all but a few lots in the town of Cambridge, filed a petition in the Commissioners' Court, asking for the vacation of all of the streets and lots except those which constituted an outlet to a few lots owned by private parties. The matter came up May 8, and protests were entered by Mrs. Dr. Charlton and David Nelson, and the matter was accordingly continued until this month. Every reasonable concession was made by the Waverly Association and the objections of Mrs. Dr. Charlton were withdrawn. In the vacation order the only streets excepted are thirty feet on Broadway easterly from the motor line. Florence street from Willamette Avenue to Seventh street, Seventh street from Willamette Avenue to Broadway, Fifth street from Florence street to Garfield street and Garfield street to the Willamette River. The Waverly Association has already macadamized a portion of Broadway nearly to the motor line and has agreed to open and macadamize Broadway 1200 feet past the motor line crossing to the Milwaukee road.

NEW INDUSTRY ON WEST SIDE.—Wisconsin Lumber Man Buys Interest in Moehne Sawmill. The Oregon City Lumber Company has just completed a 50 foot addition to the Moehne sawmill on the west side of the Willamette between Oregon City and Willamette Falls. Machinery has been ordered from Portland, Albany and San Francisco and will be here in less than 20 days, and after its installation active operations will be commenced without delay. The Oregon City Lumber Company is of recent formation. Carl A. Patzloff, a lumber man of Prairie Du Chien, Wis., arrived here several weeks ago and purchased of Charles Moehne an interest in the old Moehne mill, which has practically done no work for several years. The mill will be completely refitted with new machinery. On the upper deck there will be placed gang edgers, cut off saws, live rolls and a cable foot carriage. The planers and re-saws will be on the lower floor of the mill, which will have a capacity of 30,000 feet daily. Next year a shingle and lath mill will be added. It was Mr. Patzloff's intention to turn out shingles and laths this year but no logs can be obtained for that purpose. The local trade will be supplied and shipments will be made to southern points.
