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## Chautauqua Assembly

1902



The time for the opening of the Chautauqua Assembly of 1902 is only about twelve days distant and those who expect to attend through the sessions are making arrangements to go. The attractions this year are so numerous and varied that it requires a close scrutiny of the programme, covering the whole twelve days session, to select the features most pleasing to the individual. So many departments are incorporated into the assembly's programme that all tastes will be satisfied. Music this year will be under the direction of Prof. W. H. Boyer, of Portland. The Chemawa Indian Band, of twenty-five pieces, will present all through the session and will give a concert every day. Miss Mary Conyers will sing at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon, July 10, and other soloists will render selections during the session. On the evening of Saturday, July 12, a grand concert will be given under Prof. Boyer's direction. Mrs. Walter Reed will be the soloist and the Spitzner-Konrad string quartet will assist. At 2 o'clock on Tuesday, July 16, the Chautauqua chorus will render "My Country, 'Tis of Thee," and on the evening of Wednesday, July 16, the oratorio "Elijah" will be given. There will be a chorus of 50 voices and the soloists will be Mrs. May Dearborn Schwab, Miss Evelyn Hurley, Harry W. Hogue and Prof. I. M. Glen. Mrs. W. E. Thomas will be the accompanist.

The assembly will open at 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, July 8, with music by the Chemawa Band. President W. C. Hawley will deliver the address of welcome and the response will be made by Dr. C. E. Cline, of Portland. The remainder of the morning will be devoted to the organization of classes and the announcement of instructors. With the exception of Sunday, July 12, the morning sessions from 8 to 11 will be given to classes, which are enumerated at the close of the programme.

Baseball will have a prominent part in the afternoons of the session. There will be a game every day at 3:30 P. M., except Sunday, and five teams have entered to compete for the \$150 prize. Three of the teams are the Vancouver, which won last year's cup, the Chemawa and the Mount Aniel team.

The Portland Ministerial Union will have charge of the programme during eight days of the session at the hour of 11 A. M. J. T. Morgan, the Portland labor man, Rev. Alexander Blackburn, pastor of the White Temple, Portland, Rev. J. F. Gormley, D. D., pastor of the First Christian Church, Portland, Rev. Huber Ferguson, of the United Presbyterian Church, Portland, Rev. E. M. Sharp, A. M., pastor of the Mount Tabor Presbyterian Church, Rev. H. J. Talbot, D. D., the new pastor of the Taylor Street Methodist Episcopal Church, Portland, Rev. L. E. Rockwell, presiding elder, Portland district, M. E. Church, Rev. H. L. Boardman, D. D., president of McMinnville College, Dean W. N. Ferrin, Ph. D., Pacific University, Forest Grove, Rev. W. S. Holt, D. D., synodical missionary of the Presbyterian Church, and other leading clergymen of the state will participate in the discussions of the religious branch of the assembly.

A careful perusal of the programme will give the reader an idea of the lectures and entertainments, scheduled for the mental benefit of the public. Hon. Henry Watterson, editor of the Louisville, Ky., Courier-Journal, will deliver two addresses. On the evening of Thursday, July 10, he will lecture on "Money and Morals," and on the afternoon of the following day he will deliver a lecture on "Lincoln." The introductory address will be made by Hon. Harvey W. Scott, editor of the Oregonian.

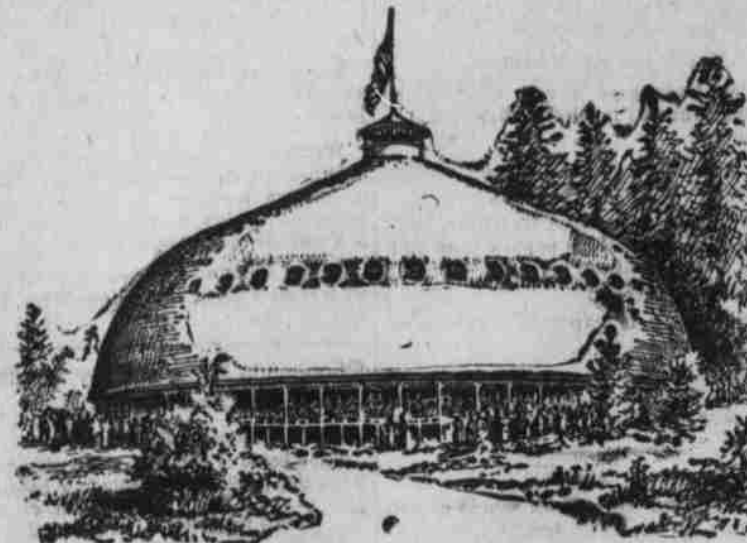
On the evening of Thursday, July 10, Colonel John Sobieski, the Polish orator, will lecture on the "Rise and Fall of Poland." On the afternoon of Friday, July 11, he will lecture a second time.

Dr. Robert McIntyre, who has attained national fame as a lecturer on soldier topics, will deliver two addresses, one on the evening of the opening day, Tuesday, July 8. His subject will be "The Battle of Life." On the afternoon of Wednesday, July 9, he will lecture on "The Sunny Side of Soldier Life."

On the afternoon of Tuesday, July 15, the programme will be devoted to the Lewis and Clark Centennial. Hon. H. W. Corbett, of Portland, will preside. Two sermons will be preached by D. Thomas McClary, of Minneapolis, on Sunday, July 13. In the afternoon he will preach on "The Evolution of Spiritual Life."
