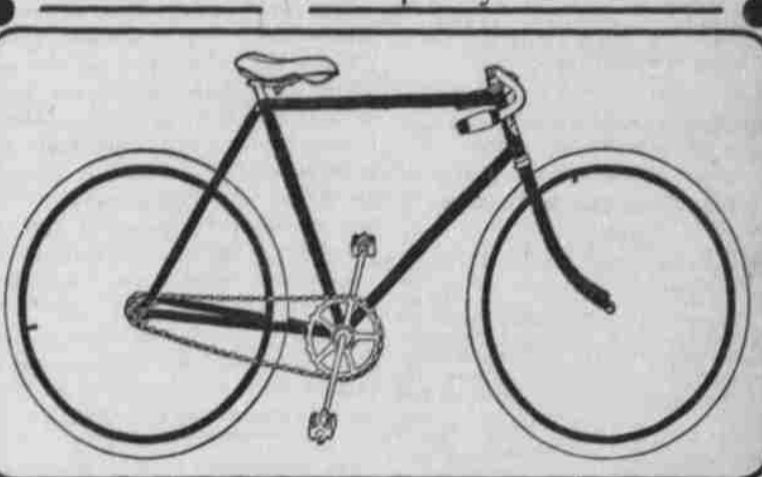

It is claimed, says the Brownsville Times, that the Spaulding Logging Company will soon commence to improve Falding River in order to float white fir and soft wood down to the Oregon City paper mills.

A. C. Woodcock, of Eugene, has been appointed referee to take testimony in the matter of the proof of an instrument purporting to be the last will and testament of Anna Reiter, deceased, and report within 10 days from June 30.

Tiffany was fined \$40 and was given 10 days in which to appeal.

On each corner of the float will be Roman figures, and on the sides will be an announcement of the celebration of Labor Day, Monday, September 1, by the labor unions of Oregon City.

The will of the late Jacob S. Risley was admitted to probate yesterday. The estate consists of the home farm near Milwaukie, about 300 acres, valued at \$24,000; a lot on the northwest corner of Seventh and Morrison streets in Portland, valued at \$20,000 and personal property and cash to the amount of \$1300, a total of \$45,000. His son, John F. Risley, is named as executor. The will was made April 22, 1885. The estate is equally divided between the three children of the deceased, John F. Risley, Charles W. Risley and Mrs. Alice M. Starkweather. The appraisers are Richard Scott, T. R. Worthington and M. Outfield.
