

Why Many Artificial Sets of Teeth Do Not Work

## They are Not Constructed Along Lines of Recent Scientific Investigations.

COME time ago it was discovered by Dr. W. I. Bonwell, a dentist, who has made many scientific investigations in relation to the human teeth, that the lower jaw forms an equilatoral triangle, the base of


