TWO COMPANIES CONSOLIDATE

Means Practically Nothing But Change in Name.

CLACKAMAS RAILWAY EXTENSION

Dispatcher Stuart Has Resigned But Otherwise There Is No Change in the Strike Situation.

The Portland City & Oregon Railway Company has been absorbed by the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company which was started last year as the Oregon General Electric Company.

The Oregon Water-Power & Railway Company is capitalized at \$2,000,000. Much has already been said about the plans for construction of an electric power station on the Clackamas River and the building of a trolley road to that property.

"We shall get to work at once on the extension into Clackamas County," said Mr. Morris. "A large steam shovel is now on the way here, and is expected to arrive any day now. We have two shiploads of rails afloat from Europe. They will reach Portland in August, and the grade will be ready then to put them down. The rolling-stock will be ready for the road when the track shall be completed. We have quite an extensive system of electric railways planned for this region, but there is nothing in the report that we are contemplating the construction of steam railroads. So far as that is concerned, however, our new lines will be up to the best standard of steam railway building.

The strike situation on the railway line is not altered by the new arrangement. Dispatcher Stuart has resigned and left for San Francisco Tuesday. Mail cars are running between Oregon City and Portland. The men are firm and still demand the removal of Superintendent Tiffany. It is not believed that the company is anxious to resume operations until the repairs to Madison street bridge are completed which will be within two weeks.

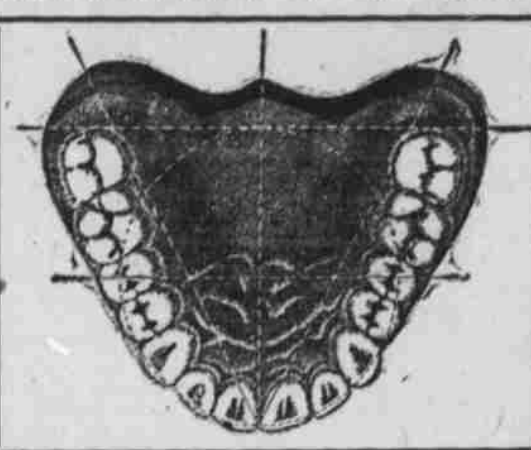
SCIENTIFIC DENTISTRY

Why Many Artificial Sets of Teeth Do Not Work Satisfactorily.

They are Not Constructed Along Lines of Recent Scientific Investigations.

SOME time ago it was discovered by Dr. W. I. Bonwell, a dentist, who has made many scientific investigations in relation to the human teeth, that the lower jaw forms an equilateral triangle, the base of which is distance from center to center of the condyles of the jaw, and the sides the distance from these points to the medium line of the inferior incisors.
