NEW PULP MILL ON EAST SIDE

Crown Paper Company Will Make Addition to Plant.

TO BE IN OPERATION BY DECEMBER

Ice Factory Will Be Moved to Make Room For New Mill Which Will Be Added to O. R. & N. Dock.

Twenty thousand pounds of pulp per day is the amount that will be turned out at the new pulp mill of the Crown Paper Company. Assistant General Manager W. P. Hawley Wednesday afternoon gave out the information that the company would, within three weeks, commence the construction of a pulp mill on the east side of the Willamette River. Several days ago the Crown Paper Company acquired from the Portland General Electric Company water rights and a site below the basin. The construction will be pushed forward rapidly and the mill will be in operation by December. About 2000 cubic yards of rock work will be necessary and bids on this have already been asked for. The basement of the Portland General Electric Company's dock, now occupied by an ice factory, will be used in connection with the new mill. The building proper will be 120 feet long but the company will build out head works to the edge of the basin. The basement of the wharf is 60 feet wide and the addition will be 40 feet, making the mill about 100x120. The company will frame in a new bulk head and supply water for the wheels through a steel pipe. One thousand horse power will be developed and 10 tons of pulp will be manufactured daily. The ice factory will probably be removed further down stream.

After the new mill is in operation the company will still continue to run its pulp mill on the west side of the river where the main plant is situated. About 250 men are now employed in the Crown Paper Company's mills in this city. The new pulp mill will give employment to 50 more men and increase the payroll of the company over \$30,000 a year.

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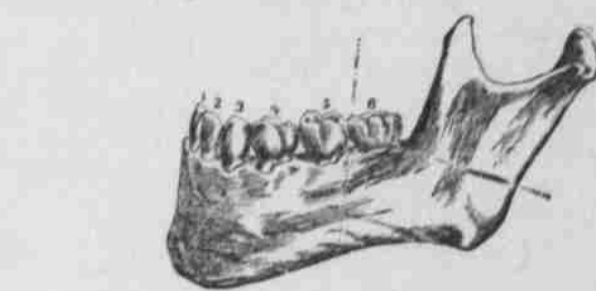

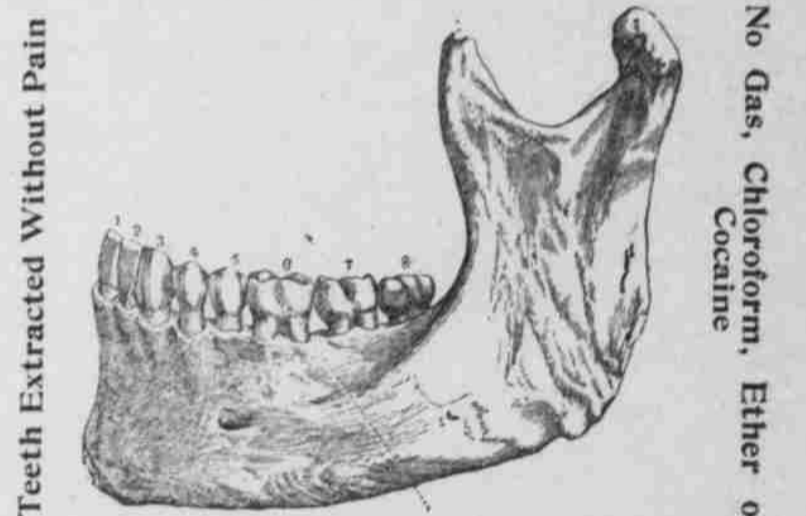
