

OIL USED FOR FUEL

LESS EXPENSIVE THAN WOOD

Woodchests, Locomotives and Manu-

facturing Plants Making Gen-

eral Use of it.

The fact is becoming established that oil-petroleum is to supplant coal and wood as a fuel in this part of the Northwest. Many firms about Portland are already using the article. The oil is brought from California.

The Columbia Southern is already fueling its engines, and reports of great success are attending its experiments. Tanks have been constructed at large to hold 40,000 gallons, and the company uses 100 barrels a day on its line. The Astoria & Columbia River is also fueling on the change, but its engines are running out of oil from the Southern Pacific, and as soon as they can come north they will probably burn oil, for two of them are already fitted with the proper furnaces and grates.

The Joseph Kellogg Transportation Company has fitted up its river boat with the proper appliances for its use, and the company's officers say that they are satisfied with the results obtained. The Southern Pacific Company is meeting a mammoth task at Bonneville and two others along the river division. This company can run the oil in its own cars from its own tanks, and the saving in coal in the mountain hauls is very great. South of Bonneville oil is used altogether, and the next year trains in and out of Portland will probably do away with the oil barrels, and institute oil engines. The Portland Rolling Mills has had the men in operation for some time, and not while its output has doubled as its production, its fuel bill has only increased one-third.

HAD A HIGH TIME.

Employed Unlawful Means of Acquiring Funds.

J. Fitzgerald, alias T. F. Cramer, and George Walker came to this city several days ago and proceeded to have a big time. After a brief stay they became valuable patrons at the Thornton liquid refreshment establishment, where they spent much time. There they also spent all the money they had, afterward calling upon the proprietor for a small loan, securing him with an order from the First National bank for \$16. Thornton advanced \$8 on the paper. Later Thornton accompanied the boys to the Oregon City Bank, where he endorsed the order and the cash was forthcoming at once. The trio returned to the saloon and the money matters between them were straightened up; Thornton became sanguine and asked for a warrant of arrest for the lad and they were taken into custody.

The order was on "The First National Bank," but no city designated, and it is considered that the orders were printed so as to be used in any city. It was signed in ink by "East Side Lumber Company," and dated August 4.

Kramer, who was the chief mover in the crime and the man who did all the business, was charged with the offence.

It has since developed that the police made a good haul when Fitzgerald was captured. Officers of Portland, Seattle and McMinnville have been looking for the gentleman for a long time. He had been in the forging business in other places. Chief Burns has received word from the Third Detective Agency in Seattle that the man was wanted in their town, where he forged a check for \$100 and then proceeded to Portland, where he did more forging. He also deserted his wife in Seattle, to whom he had been married but two short weeks.

Fitzgerald was taken before Justice Stitt Tuesday, and waived examination.

The justice fixed his bond at \$250, and being unable to get bondsman was committed to the county jail. His case will be attended to in the circuit court at the November term.
