

OIL USED FOR FUEL
 becoming General Throughout
 the Northwest.
LESS EXPENSIVE THAN WOOD
 Locomotives and Manufacturing Plants Making General Use of It.

The fact is becoming established that the petroleum is to supplant coal and gas as a fuel in this part of the Northwest. Many firms about Portland are daily using the article. The oil is imported from California.
 The Columbia Southern is already using the oil in its engines, and reports a great success in attending its expenses. Tanks have been constructed at Astoria to hold 40,000 gallons, and the company uses 100 barrels a day on its engines. The Astoria & Columbia River is also figuring on the change, and its engines are running out of a Francisco on the Southern Pacific, as soon as they can come north they probably burn oil, for two of them already fitted with the proper furnaces and grates.
 The Joseph Kellogg Transportation company has fitted up its river boat with the proper appliances for its use, and the company's officers say that they are satisfied with the results obtained. The Southern Pacific Company is getting a mammoth steel tank at Astoria and two others along the coastwise division. This company carries the oil in its own cars from its own wells, and the saving in coal in the amount of oil is very great. South of Astoria oil is used altogether, and in the next year trains in and out of Astoria will probably do away with the coal burners, and substitute oil engines. The Portland Rolling Mills has had the new in operation for some time, and that while its output has doubled since its adoption, its fuel bill has only increased one third.
 The Portland General Electric Company started to use the liquid in its plant last week. That it is economical must be a fact, for the flames of the order to waste away on the ground.
 In San Francisco all the public drives, and similar places are used present dust, and after it has soaked up the dust of time, the roadway is like a brown pavement. The Southern Pacific Company sprinkles its tracks with it to prevent dust, and to save the stageroads into the Astoria Valley has sprinkling wagons operating.

The Portland Gas Company uses it instead of coal in some parts of gas manufacture, and that it has been successful in lowering the price of production can be seen by the fact that the price of gas recently been lowered materially.

HAD A HIGH TIME.
 Employed Unlawful Means of Acquiring Funds.
 J. Fitzgerald, alias T. F. Cramer, and George Walker came to this city several days ago and proceeded to have a big time. After a brief stay they became valuable patrons at the Thornton liquid refreshment establishment, where they spent much time. There they also spent all the money they had, afterward calling upon the proprietor for a small loan, securing him with an order from the East Side Lumber Company on the First National bank for \$15. Thornton advanced \$5 on the paper. Later Thornton accompanied the boys to the Oregon City Bank, where he endorsed the order and the cash was forthcoming at once. The trio returned to the saloon and the money matters between them were straightened up. Thornton became suspicious and asked for a warrant of arrest for the lads and they were taken into custody.
 The order was on "The First National Bank," but no city designated, and it is considered that the orders were printed so as to be used in any city. It was signed in ink by "East Side Lumber Company," and dated August 4.
 Kramer, who was the chief mover in the crime and the man who did all the business, was charged with the offense. It has since developed that the police made a good haul when Fitzgerald was captured. Officers of Portland, Seattle and Minneapolis have been looking for the gentleman for a long time. He had been in the forging business in other places. Chief Burns has received word from the Thief Detective Agency in Seattle that the man was wanted in their town, where he forged a check for \$118 and then proceeded to Portland, where he did more forging. He also deserted his wife in Seattle, to whom he had been married but two short weeks. Fitzgerald was taken before Justice Stimp Tuesday, and waived examination. The justice fixed his bond at \$250, and being unable to get bondmen he was committed to the county jail. His case will be attended to in the circuit court at the November term.

THE SIZE OF FAIRIES.
 Creatures Who Live in the Poetry of the Elizabethan Age.
 Readers of Elizabethan poetry are familiar with fairies who fashion coats from a bat's wing, fans from those of butterflies, coverlets from the skins of snakes, wage war with spiders and make expeditions on the backs of fleas. Writers have commonly assumed that such minuteness was the product of poetic fancy, which reduced these sprites to a size much below that admitted by popular belief, but this is an error. Folklore supplies us with abundant examples of fairies who can carry no more than a single straw, who emerge from a molehill and make a thread bridge in order to traverse a keyhole. Concordant is the testimony of language, as when the foxglove passes for being a fairy cap.
 If a size so reduced cannot allow historical interpretation, still less does ethnology explain the qualities of these fays, who in power do not differ from their larger cousins. Queen Mab, no larger than the jewel of a ring, is yet charged with the functions of a birth goddess. The least fairy can steal a bride or a baby; tenacity is of less consequence, since any tiny sprite can at will assume gigantic proportions. The fairies who in one canton are represented as dwarfish in the next may be described as giants.
 The contrast, which cannot be accounted for as arising from historical memories, may be easily explained by the early modes of conceiving nature. In prehistoric conception a mountain might pass for a large man, a river for a tall one, while the inmates of petty hillocks would naturally be imagined as possessing a form corresponding to the narrow limits of their habitations—International Monthly.
