Eighty pickers are employed in the Risley hop yard, below town. Picking will be finished there by the latter part of next week.

The regular monthly term of the county commissioners court is in session this week, with a well filled docket of matters to be attended to.

Owing to failure in getting the targets placed in time the practice of the militia company was deferred this week. Practice will begin next Sunday.

Suit was instituted Wednesday in the circuit court by **R. A. Schmeier** and others against **Wong Long** and **Sau Tey** to recover on a promissory note.

**John W. Norris,** of Oregon City, and **James K. Hart,** of Clackamas, were each allowed a pension of \$6 per month by the federal government this week.

The fees received in the county clerk's office during the month of August amounted to \$121.35, a slight decrease from the corresponding month last year.

The bridge across Rock creek, on the Miller road, has been accepted by the county commissioners and declared open for travel. It is now a county bridge by declaration.

The county commissioners this week granted the petition of **J. C. and D. Hosteller** to construct a telephone line from Pudding river bridge along the Oregon City and Pudding river road.

**Ralph Miller** has recovered a gold watch and chain, stolen from him several months ago. The thief, becoming alarmed, left the timepiece in the yard and Mr. Miller found it Monday morning.

The barbers of the city have mutually agreed to close their shops on Saturday evenings hereafter at 11 o'clock.

Deceased was fifty years and six days of age, and leaves a husband and two sons. Her remains were laid to rest Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the late residence.

**Henry Wilkinson**, employed in the Willamette Pulp & Paper Mill, Wednesday morning met with a very serious injury to his right foot. A heavy dolly roller fell from a scaffolding, striking the member, seriously spraining it. The fact that the entire lower portion of the limb was not entirely crushed is a miracle.

**Clinton Hart**, the son of Mr. and Mrs. **Hiram Hart**, died Tuesday morning at his home in this city of paralysis. Deceased, who was 23 years of age, had been a sufferer from paralysis for the past three years, and his death was expected at any time. 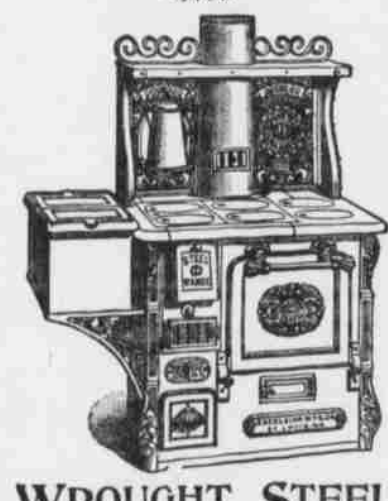

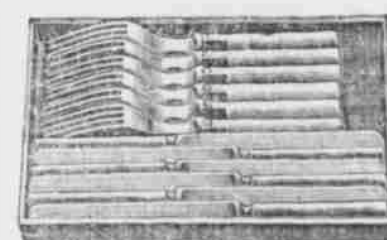
