MEAT ONCE A DAY.

Theory That Average Family's Food Is Too Heavy For Health.

Our mistakes in eating begin with our breakfast. In many families, perhaps in most, this meal commences with fruit and cereal, goes on to chops and potatoes, hot breads and coffee and concludes with griddlecakes and sirup.

At noon, when a man's stomach is only beginning to rest from all this, he has a steak, more potato, bread and butter, coffee and pie, while at home his wife has a slice of cold meat, a cup of tea and a piece of cake.

Now, no one but a woodchopper or a hunter can possibly eat meat—above all, red meat, such as beef and mutton—three times a day without inviting uric acid to come and take up its dwelling in his system.

But if we decide to give up these things, determine to have meat and potatoes only once a day and red meat only once a week; if we taboo pastry, the starchy vegetables, the white bread and heavy sweets, what have we left for the family meals?

In planning the meals on this basis there is, first of all, chicken, which is invaluable, for it may be cooked in a dozen different ways and seem a new dish each time.

FIRE AT SHUBEL.

Many Homes Destroyed and Property of all Kinds Suffers Loss.

A most terrible calamity has just befallen the residents of the vicinity of Shubel, about nine miles from the city.

This disaster was the result of a fire which had been raging there for several days and reached the climax Monday by sweeping everything before it.

Nearly two weeks ago Fred Moehnke set fire to a number of stumps, but there was no reason for apprehension.

Many of the people of the neighborhood had garnered a bounteous harvest in all lines of agriculture, having their grain and hay stored in apparent absolute safety.

Hidden from observation were the smoldering brands which Monday's heavy winds fanned to renewed activity to the extent of rapidly spreading until a conflagration had been started that was soon beyond control.

E. W. Hornschoch was one to sustain the heaviest loss. His house, barn and granary, with all their contents, were totally destroyed.

William Moehnke probably sustained the heaviest loss of any of the people in the fire district.

Fred Moehnke's barn, with all its contents, including a valuable team of horses, was destroyed, his loss being at least \$1000.

Fred Bluhm's very large barn, full of machinery and hay, and a well-filled granary, containing, among other things, 1600 bushels of wheat, were destroyed.

Chris. Hornschoch's loss is placed at \$1000 at least. His barn and its contents were destroyed, besides a number of pigs were burned, and some cattle.

W. Hill's barn, machinery and wagon were destroyed. His loss is placed at \$500 at least.

William Goenther's barn was burned, together with hay and implements, a loss of at least \$500 being sustained.

Meisinger's barn and hay were destroyed, loss about \$250.

The Robinson place was burned over, a loss sustained there of about \$400.

George Rogers, on the old Murray ranch, sustained a loss of about \$750 in grain and hay, together with the barn.

Abel Guenther lost a wagon and cow, together with his barn, the loss being anyhow \$200.

The Robert's place was damaged to at least \$250, a small house being consumed.

G. A. Schubel lost fences to the sum of at least \$200, as did also E. F. Guenther.
