Concert to be Given by Miss Conyers Promises to be a Brilliant Affair.

The concert which will be given in Woodmen Hall Tuesday evening, Oct. 28, promises to be a rare musical treat. The program as given below will be rendered. Miss Veda M. Williams, a talented young pianist of this city, will open the concert at 8 o'clock with a brilliant Chopin number. Mr. Dom Zan, Portland's favorite baritone, will sing "Israel" by King, and "Embers" by Shelley, two beautiful songs, for his first number and will be followed by Mrs. E. E. Williams, of Portland, who will play "Le Reveil D'Amour" (Moszkowski). Mrs. Williams' long residence in this city and her popularity in musical circles, coupled with the fact that she has not appeared in public here in solo work for several years, will make her number one of that all will be desirous of listening to.

Miss Grace Marshall will make her first appearance in public. She has a rich contralto voice that is capable of doing excellent work, and will sing "Thou'rt Like Unto a Lovely Flower" Verdi's "Il Trovatore" will be rendered by the Misses Draper, who will be heard to advantage in this number. Their perfect union of movement is in harmony with sympathetic touch and brilliant execution, their piano work being always appreciated. Following this number, Mrs. Robert A. Miller will give a Shakespearean reading. Her perfect enunciation and pleasing voice and her thorough knowledge of the bard of Avon, place her readings in constant demand. Mrs. Miller's charming personality is an effective instrument and she is at home with Shakespeare.

Miss Virginia Lee, a pupil of Mrs. Edgar E. Coorsen, will be heard in a solo. The mere announcement that she studies with Mrs. Coorsen will insure her many eager listeners. Mrs. Coorsen is forming a class in this city and this also is an occasion for an additional interest in Miss Lee's work.

Mr. Dom J. Zan's second number is "Bells of St. Mary's" (Rodney) and "The Indifferent Mariner" (Bullard). Mr. Zan has the happy faculty of choosing well his numbers for his magnificent voice and is never disappointing. Although he has been heard in quartette here, his solo work is far superior and in this he appears to a better advantage. Mr. Zan is one of those musicians whose "a" makes one long for the "b" and the unknown encores are harmonious and pleasing.

"Oh, That We Two were Maying" is one of Ethelbert Nevin's best, and this is saying much. Its rendition is perfectly suited to Mrs. Richard Clark Ganong's soprano. The singer's gracious manner and brilliant vocal work have won for her voice many admirers in this city.

The Maccabee Quartette will be heard in one of its inimitable medleys. Always popular, with happy thought in its selections, this quartette has made frequent appearances in Oregon City and Portland and its music is sought for on many occasions.

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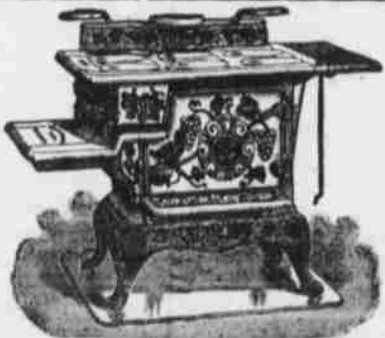
