THE LOCAL NEWS.

The work of raising the Methodist church was completed Tuesday and the excavators are at work. The excavation will be eight feet deep, and when completed the masons will take charge and construct brick walls, to a height of about twenty feet, upon which the elevated structure will rest.

Brownsville Times: Capt. Pickens and Barber Wright have returned to Oregon City. They have been here ever since the open season for killing pheasants commenced and have succeeded in bagging a great many birds, judging by the well filled gunny sacks which they shipped to Oregon City friends every day or two while here.

Mr. Wade Rhein and Miss Lena Leigh the leading characters in the productions of the Madison Square Opera Company, playing a week's engagement in this city last week, were especially good in their respective roles. Their ready conception and adaptability won for them many friends during their stay here, who while regretting their departure, wish them all kinds of success.

Mr. Fred I. Meindl and Miss Lorena Lazelle were united in marriage last Sunday afternoon at the home of the bride's father, near New Era, Judge Ryan officiating. The contracting parties are well and favorably known in this city and county, the groom having been prominent in politics here for some time, and is well known throughout the county as a school teacher of ability.

The people of Milwaukie will hold an election tomorrow for choosing town officers and deciding the question of incorporation, which has agitated the people down there for some time. The election supplies are all on hand, and while there is some opposition to incorporation, there is little doubt that the number of votes in favor of the question will be largely in excess of those against the question.

This office was presented this week with two boxes of delicious strawberries, grown by E. F. Whitten, on his place between this city and Oswego. Mr. Whitten says his vines have been producing berries continuously throughout the summer, and are now full of green fruit. Mr. Whitten is of the opinion that there will be an abundance of berries in his patch until frosts come, as there are numerous blooms on the vines.

Unitarian services in this city will be resumed beginning next Saturday evening, and will be held hereafter until further notice on Saturday evening at 7:30 o'clock instead of Sunday evening, as heretofore. The first meeting will be held at the office of Mr. Orange W. Eastham, Rev. W. G. Elliott, Jr., will preach upon the theme: "What to Believe and What to Do." All welcome.

J. W. Root's, who had been a resident of Clackamas for nearly forty years, died at his home there last Friday morning, after an illness of about a year's duration. Mr. Root served with distinction in the Mexican and civil wars, coming to Oregon and settling at Clackamas soon after the close of the latter war. Deceased was over 80 years of age, and had always been a useful and reliable citizen.

George Pfeister, of New Era, was arraigned before Judge Ryan Thursday forenoon for examination as to his sanity. Pfeister had visited the home of his wife, who lives on the Montgomery place, broke several windows and threatened to burn the buildings. The couple had been separated for a number of years and Pfeister had become deranged over brooding over the domestic trouble.

Constable Moody and Jailer Nehren brought Pfeister to town and upon examination he was committed to the asylum.

Considerable of a scare was experienced by the people of Clackamas this week, when it was discovered that what was considered smallpox or some other malignant disease had attacked the children of that place. Judge Ryan was notified by phone Wednesday morning that there were several cases of smallpox in the place, and that the schools had been closed. The judge dispatched the county physician to Clackamas at once, who returned with the information that he considered the malady nothing more than chickenpox. The schools remain closed, however.

Charles Criswell and Clarence Simmons, employed at tarring the roof of the new warehouse of the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company, near New Era, Saturday, met with quite a misfortune, which resulted in quite serious injury to both of them. The ladder on which they were standing, slipped, precipitating them to the rocks below, a distance of about 15 feet, rendering them both unconscious. They remained in this condition and position for some time before they were discovered. Simmons is still in bed, but is improving, and is expected out soon, while Criswell is about entirely recovered.

The sidewalk and fences in the vicinity of Canemah present considerable of a demolished appearance Thursday morning, after the south-bound freight had passed. In the train were two flat cars, laden with lumber, and as the train rounded the curve the speed was so great and the pressure so heavy that the upright stakes, on either side of the car, supporting the lumber, gave way and the cargo was hurled to the ground with great force, tearing up about 100 feet of sidewalk and wrecking considerable fence. Lumber was strewn along the track for some distance, and much of it was precipitated into the river.

Sheriff Shaver and his deputy experienced a considerable feeling of relief Wednesday when they had completed the work of closing up the tax roll for this year, which practically ends the work. The total amount charged on the 1901 roll was \$109,779, of which Sheriff Cooke had collected \$143,983, leaving a balance for his successor to collect of \$25,796; and of this amount Sheriff Shaver has collected all but \$5,908, or in other words, the collections since July 7th were \$19,693. The roll contained \$433 of errors and double assessments. This delinquent amount was extended on the rolls, which were turned over to Clerk Slight Wednesday afternoon, and the warrant of the county court has been attached and the rolls will be delivered back to the sheriff, commanding him to make sale of the property on which the tax has not been paid, which work he is required by law to do before the first of next March. Just how soon the sheriff will prosecute this work is not yet definitely decided, but he will very likely proceed in the matter very soon. The delinquent roll this year contains nearly \$2,100 less than the delinquent roll for last year, making a pretty good record for Sheriff Shaver, considering him to have been new in the office. The exact figures of the delinquency last year were \$7,745.75.
