OLD TOWN IS A CITY

Milwaukie People So Decide Last Saturday.

THE VOTE WAS NOT VERY CLOSE

There Was Some Opposition, But a Good Majority Favored the Action Taken.

The old town of Milwaukie is at last a city, the election at which this question was decided taking place last Saturday, and while there was some opposition to it, the people decided the question by a vote of 35 in favor against 23 opposed. At the time this question was decided a full corps of city officers was chosen to serve for two months, when a regular election will be held, at which officers will be chosen to serve for one year.

The officers of the new town are Mayor, William Shindler; aldermen, James Hooper, George Hively, T. R. A. Sellwood, P. A. Tammiman, C. Kerr, J. A. Roberts; recorder, T. H. Lecheer; treasurer, Charles McCann; marshal, Jesse Keck.

Within the corporate limits of the new town there are 377 people. The amount of territory is 400 acres within the boundary lines of the town. Milwaukie was one of the first towns established in this state, and at one time was a place of considerable pretensions as the metropolis of the state, and since the place is incorporated its career will be watched with much interest, since the officers were nominated upon a platform of economy, and while in office they will be expected to carry out that policy.

Mayor Shindler is a well known and prosperous farmer and is regarded as a very conservative man, and under his guidance and careful management, together with the good judgment of his colleagues in the council, the new town will prosper.

The first thing of any importance to be taken up will be the question of removal of the powder houses from the corporate limits of the town. This matter has agitated the people of Milwaukie for a long time, and it is expected now that something along those lines will be accomplished.

The vote for the officers was: Mayor, William Shindler, 33; aldermen, James Hooper, 43; George Hively, 43; T. R. A. Sellwood, 43; P. A. Henniman, 43; C. Kerr, 44; J. O. Roberts, 43; recorder, I. H. Lechler, 41; treasurer, Charles McCann, 42; marshal, Jesse Keck, 41.

FRANCHISE GRANTED.

Selwood People Favor Letting Railway Into Town.

At a meeting of the Sellwood Board of trade Friday night in Fireman's Hall, there was a discussion of pending railway franchises. The proposed Springwater branch of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company will pass through the southern portion of Sellwood, but nothing in the way of construction can be done while the franchises are "held up." The following resolutions were passed:

"Whereas, Every citizen in Portland wishes the advancement and development of every part of the city; and
"Whereas, Railroads leading into the country bring the producer and consumer together; and
"Whereas, The Oregon Water Power and Railway Company is now constructing a line into a district heretofore unprovided with railway facilities; and
"Whereas, Said railway will greatly increase the business of Portland and be a potent force in the development of the city; and
"Whereas, Said Oregon Water Power and Railway Company requires a franchise in the southeastern part of the city and through the warehouse district of the city for successfully carrying on its business; therefore, be it
"Resolved, By the Sellwood Board of Trade that we favor granting the franchises asked for by said company, and doing everything in our power to assist said Oregon Water Power & Railway Company and all other kindred enterprises; and that a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Common Council."

The World's Hop Crop.

An estimate of the world's hop crop for 1902 by Sonnenschein & Lauder-mann, hop dealers of Bohemia, places it at 959,444 bales, which was considerably less than any of the crops of the last three years. They estimate the total yearly beer production at about 6,868,000,000 gallons, for which about 1,222,000 bales of hops are necessary. This leaves a deficit of about 263,000 bales over the estimated production of this year, which they consider is nearly covered by old stocks on hand, although in this respect there are many dealers who think there are not enough old hops to meet the deficiency.

The crop of Saaz, Bohemia, will be about 55,000 bales of exceedingly fine quality, and the total crop of Austria Hungary 122,000 bales, against 201,000 bales in 1901. Their estimate of the leading continental hop countries for this year and last is as follows: Germany, 221,000 bales; France, 21,400 bales against 27,500 bales; Belgium and Holland, 36,750 bales, against 61,000 bales; Russia, 30,500 bales, against 50,900 bales. The total world's production in 1899 was placed at 1,314,000 bales, 1900 1,192,000 bales, 1901 1,314,000 bales.

Cost of a Battleship.

The lowest actual bid for building the new battleship Louisiana, of 16,000 tons, is \$3,990,000, or \$249.37 per ton. Our three biggest ships now under construction, the Georgia, Nebraska and New Jersey, of 15,000 tons each, were let at respective contract prices of \$239.33, \$248.88 and \$237 per ton, or an average of \$241.40. The new ship will therefore cost, if the present bids are acted upon, \$10.97 a ton more than her sisters, or a total of \$175,520 beyond a proportionate price. This increase and the very great similarity between the bids have given rise to the suspicion that there may have been collusion between the bidders.

If the lowest present bid is accepted the payment of \$4,000,000 for a single battleship is a heavy single item in the cost of becoming a "world-power."

FACTS NOT STATED

Accusations Made Which Cannot be Substantiated.

INTEGRITY OF G. A. R. INVOLVED

After Careful Research the True Facts Are Obtained and Given Out to the Public.

The following paragraphs are taken from two of our neighboring exchanges, reflecting discredit upon the members of the G. A. R. of Clackamas county and is a flagrant thrust at the organization everywhere. The following paragraph is taken from the Woodburn Independent:

"The property owners of Marion county are taxed one-tenth of a mill for an indigent soldiers' fund, which we understand has been placed at the disposal of the commandant of the Salem G. A. R. Post. Upon investigation it has been learned, we are informed, that this money does not go over five miles from Salem, and the bulk of it is disposed of in that city. Thus far this year \$300 has been paid out of this fund. Indigent soldiers residing in the county, outside of Salem, have some reason to complain of such an unfair application. We would be only too pleased to correct the error if any statement herein is erroneous, but if it is as claimed by our recognized reliable authority, then it is high time the county court's attention is called to the matter."

To these statements the Aurora Borealis adds coals of fire, and makes statements which it cannot support. Its utterances on the subject are very discreditable to itself. It says:

"It is the same in Clackamas county. Oregon City boasts all the fund with the exception of giving to a paralyzed soldier near Willhoit. This indigent was not in the condition to go to the polls to vote last spring and his rightful share of the fund was withdrawn and given to one able to vote, but the Hubbard Post, we hear, kicked so hard that the Clackamas county court had to resume extending aid."

The facts are that the county commissioners of this county have been very generous in the matter of aiding indigent soldiers throughout the entire county. The particular comrade from whom it is said aid was withdrawn has been aided very materially on more than one occasion. The G. A. R. Post of this city has exercised due care and diligence in the management of all affairs connected with the organization, and we believe there has not been a solitary breach of trust by any member or officer of the post.
