The two boys were hunting at the time, and when ordered off the place by Captain Apperson they refused to go. Sheriff Shaver was sent for, and the two were arrested and brought to Oregon City Justice Stipp, on hearing the charge, fined each of the boys \$7.50, which they paid. The guns, which they left for their appearance with the sheriff, were returned to them. The boys evidently gave fictitious names, as the names of Louis and Henry Platts do not appear in the new Portland directory.
