THE LOCAL NEWS.

In a decision at Salem Saturday Judge Burnett, of the third judicial district, decided that hop contracts were not binding. In the case passed upon, a hop grower who had contracted his crop and had received money advances, refused to surrender his crop to the buyer. The contract had been made during the seasons of cultivation and picking. Judge Burnett held that the contract was void and cannot be enforced. Unfortunately, the decision comes too late to be of benefit to growers generally, as nearly all those who contracted have surrendered their crops.

The delinquent tax list is in the hands of Sheriff Shaver for final collection of taxes. It is accompanied by a warrant from the county court, which commands the officer to advertise and sell the property on which tax remains unpaid. Under the new law the sheriff is not required to levy on the property or serve notice on the delinquent. These steps used to be necessary, but the new law eliminates them. It now stands delinquents in hand to square up matters without further delay. In the meantime interest at 12 per cent is running against all unpaid taxes, in addition to the 10 per cent penalty. So far the sheriff has set no date for the sale of property. It is necessary to advertise at least four weeks before the date of sale. Under the new law a feature of change is that at tax sales the property does not go to the highest bidder. It goes to the buyer or bidder who will pay the amount of the taxes and charge the lowest rate of interest. The purpose of the law is to enable delinquents, if they choose to redeem the property, to get it back at the lowest possible interest rate.

L. O. Nightingale has brought suit against A. H. Rich, Ethel E. Rich, Charles A. White and Delbert C. Rich for a one-third interest in the 160-acre homestead of William P. Austin, and in Kayler's saw mill. The complaint, which is drawn up by A. S. Dresser and Mayor Dimick, alleges that on August 3, 1898, A. H. Rich and J. H. Kauffman entered into a partnership for the purpose of operating a saw mill near Wilhoit, in Clackamas county; that on the same day the two partners entered into a contract with Charles White, and agreed to sell 160 acres of the William P. Austin homestead; also the Kayler saw mill and all buildings, machinery and attachments connected. On December 17, 1898, Kauffman sold his interest to L. O. Nightingale, who became a partner of A. H. Rich. On November 12, 1900, the full consideration for the sale of the property having been received, Charles A. White, A. H. Rich and Ethel E. Rich, the plaintiff further alleges, conspired to defraud him of his rights and interest in the property by causing a conveyance of the property to be executed by White to Ethel E. Rich, Nightingale prays for a decree entitling him to one-third interest in the property, and that the defendant, Ethel F. Rich, be restrained from cutting down or taking any of the timber from the property.

Clackamas county is in need of more creameries; in fact, this county could support many of these wealthy producers, but more of them than now exist are an absolute necessity. It is surprising that more people have not engaged in the creamery business in this county. Every condition exists here to contribute to the success of that business and make it profitable. Feed is plentiful and cheap and the market is all that could be asked for. Butter can be produced in this county as cheaply as any-

where in Oregon, and yet the article always commands the highest market price. True enough, in the early part of the season the price for butter usually rules pretty low, but the Oregon butter producer can always figure on a high price for his product for at least eight months during the year, just at present the prevailing price for the product of well-conducted creameries, operated on scientific principles, being 30 cents a pound, with excellent prospects of the price being higher before the winter is done. The knowledge is readily gained from interviews with local merchants that no line of industry in our county promises better than does the dairy business. Where the business is conducted on scientific principles there is nothing in store but the most promising conditions and success in the matter is assured.

Humane Society Meets.

The Clackamas County Humane Society held its annual meeting Wednesday evening for the purpose of electing officers and transacting other business. The president, Mrs. Anita McCarver, and vice-president, G. A. Harding, were re-elected, Mrs. E. G. Canfield being chosen secretary and E. G. Canfield treasurer for the ensuing year. The receipts of the society for the past two years amounted to \$220.40, the disbursements equaling that amount, with the exception of \$1.92, which remains on hand. The following report of the president of the society was submitted and adopted:

OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE CLACKAMAS COUNTY HUMANE SOCIETY:

The year just closing has been one of the most successful. The usual number of complaints about the abuse of animals and neglect of and cruelty to children have been made. In every case the complaint has been followed up with thorough investigation. Where the complaint was well founded such steps as were deemed wise have been taken. In nearly every case quiet measures are sufficient to secure a reform of the abuse complained of and the Society has rejoiced that it has not been necessary to go farther with the matter.

The one accomplishment of the past year, to which we point with the greatest pride, is the fountain which has been erected on Main street. The Society does not claim to have secured this alone; its purchase was made possible only by the generous aid given to us by the Council of Oregon City and by the co-operation of many good and kind friends. To these, one and all, the Society is under the deepest obligation and hereby expresses its gratitude. Without their help we would not now have the fountain. The only claim which we make is that it was ours to start the agitation which has ended so happily. The fountain is both a thing of beauty and a great good to the community. Its beautiful proportions will always be a reminder of the beautiful purpose of the humane societies all over our country. It stands as the monument of that which is best in the city when its people say, "There shall be no more abuse of dumb animals nor cruel treatment of children." The children will see in it a most powerful object lesson and they will grow up to be the friends and protectors of the friendless. The sparkling water which it dispenses night and day will cool many a parched tongue. Perhaps it may to a certain extent keep some from tasting drinks, the end of which is drunkenness and bestiality. The good which such a fountain accomplishes to a community can never be calculated. It is an inspiration to better things along the line of municipal ad-

ministration. It is proof to every wayfaring man that there is a determined society in Oregon City which is ready to go to the rescue of child and beast when abused. Altogether it is to be regarded as an advance step in the life of the city.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY'S WEALTH.

Summary of Assessment Shows Increase of \$49,020 Over Last Year.

Assessor Eli Williams has completed the assessment of the property of Clackamas county for the year 1902, as equalized by the county board, there being an increase shown all along the line, the totals being as follows:
