SOL HIRSCH DEAD

Pioneer Merchant of Portland
Passes Away.

PROMINENT IN OREGON POLITICS
Was Elected to Oregon Legislature in 1880 and Minister to Turkey in 1889.

Solomon Hirsch, the pioneer merchant, Minister to Turkey during Harrison's Administration, and for 14 years a member of the Oregon Legislature from Multnomah County, died of heart failure at his home in Portland, Monday. His death was entirely unexpected and came as a great shock to his hosts of friends in Oregon. While he had been ill several weeks, and had been confined to his room on several occasions, his malady was not thought likely to prove fatal. During the last two or three days he had been suffering more than usual from his heart trouble, and his physician, Dr. A. J. Giesy, had been in frequent attendance upon him.

All the members of his family were at home when he passed away. As soon as the news of his death had gained circulation, scores of close friends of the bereaved called to offer words of consolation or sent messages of condolence. In business and social circles expressions of sorrow were mingled with words of praise for the many excellent qualities of the deceased. Every where there was a feeling of almost personal loss in the death of one of Portland's best known, most successful and most highly honored citizens.

His Early Career.
Solomon Hirsch was born in Wurtemberg, Germany, March 25, 1839, and was, therefore, 63 years and 9 months old when he died. He was one of a family of 11 children, and his parents being poor he was early in life compelled to make his own way in the world. He had been given a common school education in the public schools of Germany, and with only this and an indomitable perseverance he set forth at the age of 14 years to seek his fortune in the New World. Soon after landing in New York he secured employment as clerk in a store in New Haven, Conn., and then began the mercantile experience which has since made him a man of wealth and a leader in the building of the commercial interests of Portland. After a few months behind the counter in New Haven, he returned to New York, and a few weeks later went to Rochester, N. H., where he was engaged as an office clerk at a small salary. Attracted by the opportunities that offered themselves in the far West, he came to Oregon in the Spring of 1858, and engaged in business at Dallas, Polk County, in partnership with his brother, Edward Hirsch. A fair measure of success attended the enterprise, and two years later the Hirsch brothers removed to Silverton,

where they conducted a general merchandise store until 1864, when Solomon Hirsch sold out his interests and went to Salem to engage in business with his brother Mayer. In the Fall of 1864 he went to Portland, where he has since resided.

Active in Politics.
In politics Mr. Hirsch was always active and aggressive, and his influence was always felt in the shaping of the policies of the Republican party, with which he affiliated. He was a delegate to nearly every Republican county convention and county convention for 40 years, and served four terms as chairman of the Republican State Central Committee. His first effort in politics was a forecast of the success which has attended him since for in 1864 he worked for and secured the selection of his brother, Mayer Hirsch, as a delegate to the National convention which nominated Abraham Lincoln for his second term. To a very pleasing manner in his business relations, a readiness to grant any favor within his power and a faithfulness to his friends, his success in politics was largely due.

The official career of Solomon Hirsch began in 1872, when he was elected a member of the Oregon House of Representatives as a member from Multnomah County. The business ability already demonstrated in his private life gained for him the chairmanship of the ways and means committee, the most important and committee in the Legislature.

Candidate for U. S. Senate.
In 1885, at the solicitation of his friends, Mr. Hirsch became a candidate for United States Senator, and in the memorable campaign which followed he lacked but a few votes of election. Finding that his election was impossible, he advised his friends to turn to some other man upon whom a majority could agree. Loyal to the last, they refused to do this, but continued to vote for him until the fall of the gavel announced the final adjournment of the Legislature.

Minister to Turkey, 1889.
In 1889 President Harrison appointed Solomon Hirsch Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the empire of Turkey. Mr. Hirsch was in Europe at the time, and upon learning of his appointment he visited Constantinople and then returned to America for his credentials. His appointment received universal approval in Oregon and was taken as a recognition not only of the worth of the man but also of the part Oregon had taken in the presidential election.

The banquet tendered Mr. Hirsch at the Concordia Club on October 22, two days before his departure for Constantinople, eclipsed any event of a similar nature ever given in Portland, and was a fitting testimonial of the warm place in the hearts of the people of this city. The banquet was arranged by the Portland Board of Trade, the details of the event being in charge of a committee comprised of President John McCracken, Donald Macleay, Charles F. Seabe, E. S. Rothchild, Ben Selling, U. M. Dunne and P. Lowengart. The decorations in the clubroom were all that the florist's art could produce. Around the festive board were gathered all of Portland's most prominent citizens and all were there to show their gratification over the honor that had been conferred upon Mr. Hirsch and the State of Oregon. Donald Macleay presided as toastmaster and toasts were responded to by Judge George H. Williams, General John Gibbon, John McCracken, Governor Penneyer, Mayor De Lashmott, D. Sells Cohen, British Vice-Consul James Laidlaw, J. W. Whalley and F. D. McKee.

Though he refused to be a candidate for office since his retirement from the State Senate in 1886, Mr. Hirsch was always active in politics. He was a charter member of the James G. Blaine Republican Club, which was organized in 1887, and was several times a delegate from that club to the State League of Republican Clubs. In the last few months he has been frequently mentioned as a possible successor to United States Senator Simon, though he was not in any sense a candidate for that office.

In 1870 Mr. Hirsch married Miss Josephine Mayer, eldest daughter of Jacob Mayer. Besides the widow, he leaves three daughters, Ella, Mai and Cleonine and one son, Sanford, all residents of Portland.

Loyal to His Faith.
In religion Mr. Hirsch was a Hebrew and was a loyal adherent and supporter of his church. He was president of the Temple Beth Israel congregation. He was a 32d degree Mason and was a member of the following lodges of that order: Lodge, No. 2, A. F. & A. M.; Oregon Consistory, No. 1, Scottish Rite Masons, and Al Kader Temple, No. 1, Ancient Order of the Mystic Shrine.

Mr. Hirsch was of a benevolent disposition and gave liberally of his wealth to many charities in a quiet and inconspicuous way.
