SOL HIRSCH DEAD

Pioneer Merchant of Portland Passes Away.

PROBINENT IN OREGON POLITICS

Was Elected to Oregon Legislature in 1880 and Minister to Turkey in 1889.

Solomon Hirsch, the ploneer merchant, Minister to Turkey during Harrison's Administration, and for 14 years a member of the Oregon Legislature from Multnomah County, diet of heart failure at his home to Portland, Monday. His death was entirely unexpected and came is a great shock to his hosts of friends in Oregon. While he had been ill several weeks, and had been confined to his room on several occasions, his malady was not thought likely to prove fatal. During the last two or three days he had been suffering more than usual from his heart trouble, and his physician, Dr. A. J. Gresy, had been in frequent attend-

All the members of his family were at nome when he passed away. As soon as the news of his death had goined circulation, scores of close friends of the bereaved called to offer words of consola tion or sent messages of condolence. In business and social circles expressions of sofrow were mingled with words of praise or the many excellent qualities of the deceased. Everywhere there was a feeting of almost personal loss in the death of one of Fortland's best known, most successful and most highly honored cit-

His Early Career.

Solomon Hirsch was born in Wortem-berg, Germany, March 25, 1839, and was, therefore, 63 years and 9 months old then he died. where they conducted a general mer-chandles store until 1864, when Solomon Hirsch sold out his interests and went to Salem to engage in business with tile brother Mayer. In the Fall of 1864 he went to Portland, where he has since remided.

Active in Politics.

In politics Mr. Hirsch was always active and aggressive, and his influence was always left in the shaping of the policies of the Republican party, with which he affiliated. He was a delegate to nearly every Republican county convention and state convention for 40 years, and served four terms as chairman of the Republi-can State Central Committee. His first effort in politics was a forecast of the success which has attended him since or in 1864 he worked for and secured the selection of his brother, Mayer Hirsch, as a designate to the National convention which nominated Abraham Lincoln for his second term. To a very pleasing manner in his business relations, a readiness to grant any favor within his power and a faithfulness to his friends, his suc ress in politics was largely due.

The official career of Solomon Hirsch began in 1872, when he was elected a member of the Oregon House of Repre entatives as a membericon Multnomah County. The business ability already demonstrated in his private life gained for him the chairmanship of the ways and means committee, the most importand committee in the Legislature.

Candidate for U. S. Senate.

In 1885, at the solicitation of his friends, Mr Hirsch became a candidate for United States Sena'or, and in the memorable campaign which followed be lucked but a few votes of election. Finding that his election was impossible, he advised his friends to turn to some off er man upon whom a majority could agree. Loyal to the last, they refused to do this, but continued to vote for him until the fall of the gavel announced the final ad-journment of the Legislature.

Minister to Turkey, 1889.

In 1880 President Harrison appointed Solomon Hirsch Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Pienipotentiary to the em-pire of Turkey. Though he refused to be a candidate for office since his retirement from the State Senate in 1885, Mr. Hirsch was always active in politics. He was a charter member of the James G. Blaine Republican Club, which was organized in 1887, and was several times a delegate from that club to the State League of Republican Clubs. In the last few months fie has been frequently menioned as a possible successor to United States Senator Simon, though he was not in any sense a candidate for that

In 1870 Mr. Hirsch married Miss Jose three daugnters, Ella, Mai and Cleantiline and one son, Sanford, all residents of Portland.

Loyal to His Faith.

In religion Mr. Hirsch was a Hebrew and was a loyal adherent and supporter of his church. He was president of the Temple Beth Israel congregation. He was a 32d degree Mason and was a mem ber of the following 'odges of that order:
